### **Program Overview**

<u>Who we are</u>: Unitarian Universalists (UU's) are a diverse and welcoming association of independent churches and fellowships who believe in the worth and potential of every individual. We do not follow a creed but believe in every person's right to evolve his or her own spirituality throughout life. We believe that we never stop learning and growing. Each UU church determines its own plan for the religious and spiritual education and exploration of its children, youth, and adults using materials developed by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and other sources.

<u>What we teach</u>: We are a liberal religious community that respects all people (community building), honors the teachings of all major religions (world religions), values peace and justice and practices conflict resolution (social justice), works to preserve the planet (environmental justice, web of life), and values our original roots (Jewish and Christian heritage, UU history). <u>Program Offerings</u>: Our RE year coincides with the school year. We offer Religious Education (RE) programming and nursery care mid-September through early June. Program offerings include:

- Sunday morning RE workshops (aka Sunday School) for PreK-grade 6
- Nursery care for children under 4
- Youth programs for grades 7-12
- Intergenerational events, activities and worship services
- Multi-age activities and projects for PreK-grade 6

<u>Our Program Volunteers</u>: Our volunteer leaders are often parents of children in our RE program, but some are grandparents or other adults from our church. We believe that everyone is a teacher and everyone is a learner. We are always looking for folks to serve as leaders and assistants in our classes and programs. If you would like more information on serving our church in this way, please contact the Religious Education Committee (REC) or the Director of Religious Education (DRE).

<u>The Religious Education Committee (REC)</u>: The REC works with the Director of Religious Education (DRE) to plan and facilitate classes and activities for children and youth, select curriculum, recruit volunteers, and form RE policies and goals. The committee meets monthly, September through June. We would welcome your presence as a member. # **Sunday Morning RE Programs**

Sunday Morning Schedule: RE groups, workshops, and nursery care are provided during the service September through early June. The nursery is open at 9:45 and nursery staff arrives at 9:50. On occasion when nursery staff must call out sick and we cannot find a substitute, the nursery will be open but unstaffed. Parents are invited to use the nursery during the worship service as needed. The worship service can be seen and heard from inside the nursery. With the exception of nursery age children, everyone typically begins Sunday mornings in the sanctuary. After a story or presentation geared toward children, the RE leaders and children will leave to participate in groups or workshops in the RE area. This generally happens around 10:15. We have four Sunday morning RE groups divided according to the following grade levels: PreK-K, 1-3, 4-6, and 7-12 (youth group). RE programs end at 11:15. Most weeks parents have a little time to gather for coffee or other beverages during hospitality hour following the worship service before RE classes end. Children in the PreK-K and 1-3 age groups must be picked up by a parent at 11:15. Children in grades 4-6 will be released from programs to find their families at 11:15. Parents are responsible for their children before and after RE programming. Youth group meetings occur on many Sunday mornings that RE classes are scheduled. On mornings that there is no youth group meeting scheduled, youth group members are invited to attend the worship service with their families, volunteer to assist with the younger children, or work in childcare. Any youth interested in being on the list of paid childcare providers must have completed a babysitting course; please contact the DRE if your middle or high schooler is interested in being on this list. ## <u>Curriculum</u>

Our program runs on a three-year curriculum rotation: 1) World Religions, 2) Unitarian Universalist Identity and History, and 3) Social & Environmental Justice. This year we are exploring Unitarian Universalist Identity and History. For grades 1-6 we are use a workshop model for programming on Sunday mornings. Each month the entire RE program will have a topic and a famous UU of focus. The 1-6<sup>th</sup> graders will explore these topics in different ways through workshops each Sunday of that month. RE "Guide", an adult volunteer who is part of a team of people assigned to each age group, leads the opening ritual. After the opening ritual (about 5- 10 minutes) the group will participate in a workshop activity led by a volunteer from the congregation. Depending on the workshop and the numbers needed for a specific activity,

the RE age groups will participate in activities together or separately. The workshops will vary and will incorporate art, music, drama woodworking, movement, and more. Some examples of upcoming workshops this year are: cooperative games, painting, cider pressing, yoga, songwriting, and theater. The PreK-K Group and the Youth Group will also be using the monthly topics to guide their programming. The PreK-K group explores the larger theme and topics through picture books, simple craft activities, and lots of play. Youth group is an open group for 7-12<sup>th</sup> graders in which we focus on community building, games, fun, and an exploration of the topics within our yearly theme. This program year we are offering our Coming of Age program for 9-12<sup>th</sup> graders from January- early June. The goal of Coming of Age is to provide an opportunity for teens to explore and clarify their beliefs and purpose, and to gain a clear sense of themselves, their place in the UU faith and in the world. The program culminates with a worship service, designed by program participants, in which each participant presents her/his credo. This is a closed group and youth participants must sign up by early January and commit to regular attendance and completion of activities. There will be a parent orientation in early January. #### **Registration and Safety Information**

<u>Registration Forms</u>: Those that participate in RE programs on a regular or semi-regular basis must fill out a registration form. Registration forms allow us to keep track of attendance, disseminate program information, monitor allergy and other health issues, and to be aware of other individual needs of program participants. You can fill out a registration form online <a href="here">here</a>. Registration Fee: We ask families to pay a yearly registration fee of \$20 per child or a maximum of \$50 per family. There are registration scholarships for any family that would struggle to pay this fee. Please speak to the DRE if a scholarship is requested. The registration fees go toward our RE budget of art supplies, snack, volunteer training, and intergenerational events and parties.
