

... MINISTER'S MUSINGS...



I used to love Christmas trees. I still do, but things are different now.

Over the years I have collected an array of tree ornaments that remind me of people or events. Some ornaments are lovely, some funny. Some are old – from my parents, my childhood. Very few are new, though, because our family no longer puts up a Christmas tree.

I tell you this not to advocate new holiday traditions, but to offer a story about adapting to change. This year some Christmas traditions UUCB has long held dear will change, and adapt we must, at least for now. We no longer have our own sanctuary to decorate. Every Sunday we have to put away everything, leaving no traces of our religion around. That means we cannot leave Christmas decorations out at the Minnie Brown Center. We cannot bring a tree in mid-way through December and leave it there for several weeks. Nor can poinsettias decorate the pulpit area, except on Christmas Eve. For one thing, who would water them? For another, both ethically and contractually, we are obliged to respect our Jewish friends whose space we use.

When our son was born shortly before Christmas, Steve and I instituted a new family tradition: A decree went up from Stocker-Wellcome that no tree should ever enter our home until after David's birthday. That way, his birthday and Christmas remained distinct from one another.

For a dozen years or so, the first Saturday after David's birthday, we would procure a spruce to adorn our home. I loved the excitement of our quest, the cold air nipping at our noses as we trudged through the field imagining how various trees would look in our space. I loved pulling the ornaments out of their boxes, revisiting memories. I loved the colored lights that added sparkle to our tree. I was blessed with a spouse who took charge of watering; all I had to do was stand back and thrill to the beauty.

One memorable year our tree continued to grow, even though it had been cut. By the time we took the tree down, the branches had sprouted an inch or more of new growth at their tips. That poor tree, already dead, had wanted so to live! How sad I felt discarding that tree at the end of the season. Such a strong life force should be awarded more dignity than to land in a brush pile, it seemed to me.

That year I started to regard Christmas trees differently. I started to feel uncomfortable about chopping down an entire tree so that I could have it in my home for a few short weeks.

We continued getting trees, despite my rumbling disquietude. Then in 2001 Steve lost his job three months before Christmas. It took 16 long months for Steve to find work again. I was an intern minister at the time, receiving a stipend of \$3,000 per year. To augment that princely

sum, I worked as a Teaching Assistant for three Hebrew Bible classes at Andover Newton Theological School – at \$750 per class. Those numbers were burned into my brain. With money in such tight supply, I remembered every nickel that came our way.

Trimming all unnecessary expenses meant jettisoning the tree. We also largely abandoned giving gifts. We discovered something interesting: Christmas was just fine without the trappings. We still had each other. We still had a quiet day to play, read, cook, and simply be together. When Steve returned to work and I began my first ministry, we could easily have put it all back – tree, gifts, all of it – but we chose otherwise. We have had only one tree since then – the year we had a guest from Belgium, and we wanted to show her an American Christmas.

In all those years, I have certainly enjoyed other trees – many of them at the churches with which I have been associated, among them the trees that graced our sanctuary. Those trees transformed the room in a magical way. I will miss that magic this year.

But I know from experience that I can face changes with grace and good spirits. Things will feel different this year, but I know we have each other – to sing, to laugh, to weep, and to celebrate together. This year, when we have lost so much, we have each other – the best blessing of all. Merry Christmas.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN/ANNUAL BUDGET DRIVE

THE SHED? With our November 20 vote to proceed with architectural drawings for our sanctuary and RE and office space, excitement is growing about our efforts. RE parents struck a strong chord when they asked, “Why would we build a house (i.e. state-of-the-art sanctuary) for the adults and put the kids in the shed (i.e. Pennell)?” This question supported Recovery Team’s Building Plan B - designing a new sanctuary AND a one-story structure on the Pennell House site that would ensure adequate and safe space for our RE program and for our administrative staff with full accessibility for all. Our vote shows our commitment to planning a dream facility that will help fulfill our mission statement, meet our needs of today, and allow us to grow for many years.

A CONSULTANT? The Development Committee will interview potential fund-raising consultants, including those identified by the UUA, to give us the help we need to carry out a successful Capital Campaign. When we find the right person and negotiate the details, we’ll be asking for an official congregational vote to authorize payment.

FUN? We’ll continue to raise awareness and generate excitement in the weeks ahead. You can anticipate some fun skits, rousing testimonials, and great music.

WHAT ABOUT THE MONEY? In January our consultant will conduct a feasibility study with a cross-section of the congregation to determine UUCB’s readiness for a successful Capital Campaign. With a Go Ahead from the consultant and a vote from the congregation, we’ll launch our campaign in February in conjunction with the Annual Budget Drive. This means that we’ll each be visited only once for the two giving opportunities, the Capital Campaign and the Annual Budget Drive. We’ll have fun along the way with celebratory events and occasional fundraisers such as a Chocolate Buffet at Wilbur’s in Freeport January 15.

DREAM ON AND STEP UP! We encourage everyone to keep their imaginations busy with ideas and dreams about our new facilities – think out of the shed! The work of these campaigns requires many volunteers. Hasn’t the Recovery Team been amazing? We’re pleased that many other folks have stepped up to offer their leadership in both the planning phase and the actual campaign. Perhaps Clyde will reappear – without duct tape this time! MOVING TOWARD OUR GOALS: MUSIC AND THE SPIRITUAL COMMUNITY

If you asked a sample of UUCB congregants how we promote our mission statement's goal of *being a spiritual community*, you would probably get a wide variety of replies. But if those replies had any one thing in common, it would probably be a heart-felt testimony to the musical life of our church.

This is a congregation unusually blessed with musical talent. We have a stable of pianists whose performances at Sunday services are stirring beyond any ordinary expectations, while a variety of other remarkably talented instrumentalists appear in and amongst them to vary and enliven our services. We have a choir whose strong vocal showing, thanks to spirited direction and accompaniment, gives our services a major musical lift. In addition we have several a cappella singing groups who add to the riches of our musical life. Some of our musicians are songwriters as well as instrumentalists and perform their own work for us, sometimes even introducing a work written especially for us. Grace Lewis-McLaren has produced an entire collection of songs of her own composition

(the thematically as well as musically rich *Songs of Grace*), available as another source of hymn selections for Sunday services. Behind the scenes we have a dedicated Music Committee, working to enhance music as a part of worship and of church life generally. It shouldn't go unmentioned, what's more, that we've been lucky enough to have two musical ministers in a row, rare good fortune for any congregation!

One impressive aspect of UUCB musical life, quite apart from the talent so much in evidence, is the apparent seamlessness with which musicians, minister, and Worship Committee interact, aided by the Music Coordinator's mindfulness of all the musical elements involved. The musical participants as well as all the other participants for a whole month's services need to be involved in the planning for four or five successive Sundays, each taking into account the chosen theme for a given service and their own as well as other contributions to it. The Music Coordinator, in consultation

with the minister and the chair of the Worship Committee, makes sure that musical choices are appropriate to the theme of the service and are safely assigned to particular performers for the Sunday in question. It's a small weekly miracle that with so many "moving parts" -- the variety of musicians, the complex musical structure of each service (prelude, hymns and/or musical selections, offertory, postlude) -- the music for each service emerges as not just coherent but spirit-stirring.

Equally impressive is the congregation-wide response when music itself is the theme of a service or a special event. The turn-out is typically outstanding, and the many people who work hard to put these music-rich occasions together have the satisfaction of knowing that music is serving, just as it should, as a source of spiritual enrichment for every person present.

Of peace on earth, good-will to men!


And thought how, as the day had come,

FROM THE BOARD CHAIR...

When you look at UUCB, the statement “if you build it they will come” seems less prophetic than might be the statement “in the wake of trauma, they will notice.” I know many things have contributed to our visibility in the wider community other than the fire: our people, our message and our commitment to our principles are among the powerful elements reaching out from our congregation. But our traumatic loss just may be a catalyst for building energy from the inside and attracting notice from outside, leading to good things.

Whatever the causes, and in spite of the tragedy, we have much to celebrate. On Nov. 20 we welcomed 17 new members to the congregation. The Membership Committee continues to spearhead and encourage us all to welcome newcomers as the blessing they are – proof that our church has an important role in people’s lives, and we all can feel it. Our RE program is flourishing and attracting young families. And the best part is that new and experienced UUs alike are nourished by their involvement, just as they nourish us.

In an unexpected development from the ashes, we have a balanced budget for this year. On Dec. 4, the Board will present the budget, revised from the provisional budget of June, showing increased income from pledges and insurance compensation for the loss of rental. We will also show reduced expenses by not having to keep the church building electrified and warm. Although these

fire-related adjustments have helped, I am most encouraged by the strong response in pledges – from longtime members and new folks alike. So many people are expressing that UUCB is indeed an important part of their lives and as such deserves a greater share of support. This makes me very hopeful for meeting challenges to come.

Following the Nov. 20 vote for the building plan, we face financial anxiety, but in my mind we also face a very attractive opportunity. You will hear much in the near future about a Capital Campaign and the benefits a successful campaign will achieve; you will also be asked to participate. A new Building Committee will carry on the work of the Recovery Team in the concrete tasks of building a building. From my seat, I am focused on the Board as the body with fiduciary responsibility for the Church. Please be assured that we will continue to pay close attention to the “ways and means” and will steward the finances of both the Church and the new building project.

As Trustees, we are encouraged and energized with our new members and all the activity both within the congregation and in the wider community. “They” are coming even before “we build it”. We are thankful for all of the great things the Church is doing and for the promise of great things to come.
