RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Another great program year has come to a close. Many thanks go out to our volunteer RE leaders, without whom our programming would not be possible. We recognized our RE teachers in May during the RE celebration service, but another group of RE leaders that is often doing more of the behind the scenes work is the RE Committee. I had the pleasure of collaborating with Jean Lay, Melissa Fochesato, Cathey Cyrus, Kate Phenix, and Nathan Haynes this year (and some of those folks for several years now!). They are a great group of people who bring energy, enthusiasm, great ideas, vision, and much more the planning and implementation of RE programming. Last month I mentioned that there will be some changes taking place in the structure of Sunday morning RE programming. The RE Committee has been working with me

to develop those changes and I'd like to share some of those changes with you here.

In the 2016/2017 program year, RE will shift from traditional classroom Sunday morning programming to a workshop model which the RE Committee and I feel will best fit the needs and interests of our children, families, and congregation. We will still follow the three year rotation that focuses on the meta-themes of Community and Justice, UU History and Identity, and World Religions. This coming year our theme is World Religions. Each month RE will have a topic and a story of focus that the children will explore in different ways through workshops each Sunday of that month. These workshops will be created and led by members and friends of our congregation (hopefully you!) who have a skill, interest, or hobby that they would like to share with the RE program. On Sunday mornings the children will still start out in the worship service through the "Time for All Ages". Following the "Time for all Ages", the children will head back to their RE age groups and spaces where an RE "Guide", an adult volunteer who is part of a team of people assigned to each age group, leads the opening ritual. After the opening ritual (about 5- 10 minutes) the group will participate in a workshop activity led by a volunteer from the congregation. By offering workshops we hope to draw in many people from the larger congregation who would enjoy sharing their love of painting, cooking, music, writing, drawing, sculpture, sewing, knitting, gardening, poetry, movement/dance, fitness, video, theater/drama, service, building, magic, martial arts, science, nature, origami, quilting, pottery, animals, woodworking... As you can see, there are practically endless possibilities! We expect that there are many people who would be wonderful mentors to our children who would not necessarily consider volunteering throughout a year-long program.

Please consider offering your time and talents with the RE program in 2016/2017 by sharing your skills, interests, and hobbies to create and lead a workshop(s). The RE Committee and I are eager to engage more of the congregation in getting to know our children and helping them feel welcome in our church community. If you have any questions or would like to talk about this request and opportunity, please let me know!

The Board is responsible for conducting the worship service that day, and I assure you, it will be timely so we can start the Annual Meeting quickly and efficiently following the worship service. We will be looking for each of you that day, as your opinion matters!

RENTAL AND BUILDING USE NOTES

The Rental Subcommittee (of the Building & Grounds Committee) has some good news, a reminder and a request.



Good news: Rentals from groups outside the church are on track to generate over \$5,000 this year. This is money that goes into Operations for UUCB, and helps cover utilities and building infrastructure. UUCB is gaining a reputation as a great venue for musical events in particular, and a convenient place for nonprofit group meetings both large and small. We expect rentals to be strong in the upcoming year as well.

Reminder: Keeping our building secure is a critical issue. *If you have access to the building after-hours (with a code or key) and you open up for a committee meeting or other activity, then YOU are responsible for locking and securing the building when you leave.* It may happen that another group comes in and stays later, so if you are not the last to leave, it is **YOUR RESPONSIBILITY** to hand off closing duty directly to another person who also has a key /code, and who knows how to close properly. All this info is included in a Closing Procedures document on the website at <http://www.uubrunswick.org/member-info/policies-and-procedures/>. Check it out, don't take closing up lightly, its serious business.

Avoiding Conflicts: If you are planning an event, meeting or activity, you can check availability of a particular date in a particular room or part of the building first, then contact Shirley to get things set up. Remember that the dates and times in the calendar are firm commitments, and your reservation time should include setup and cleanup times, as another group could reserve the same space at either end of your reservation and we can avoid conflicts as long as each respects the time reservation of the other.

Serving residents of Brunswick, Topsham, Harpswell, Bowdoin, Bowdoinham, Lisbon, Lisbon Falls and Durham MCHPP's mission is to reduce hunger by providing food assistance, sustainable living education, and referral services



to households living at or below poverty. Currently seven programs are managed by staff at MCHPP: the soup kitchen, food pantry, food bank, elders program, summer feeding for school age children & summer day camps, weekly workshops-living education program and the food security coalition of MidCoast Maine. UUCB members volunteer regularly at MCHPP and have for many, many years. Together we all make a difference. END INEQUALITY FORUM, MAY 21



Church members turned out to hear the five study groups present information and potential solutions to equity issues which they have studied for six months.

Our topics included education, healthcare, income, justice, and shelter/food. Each group offered a slide show describing early considerations, focus areas, facts they learned and recommended actions that we can take as individuals, small groups or as a whole church. Every study group created a poster with graphics, pictures and text for a “walkabout” session when we could absorb and talk about the information. Finally, the whole group asked questions and offered ideas that we could get behind. Working as a church or partnering with other churches and organizations, we can impact these issues with our time, resources and talents.

Though it is impossible in this space to highlight all that we learned, here are some key points:

- The education study group found that the greatest long-term benefit comes from working with pre-school children, as brain development is the foundation for lifelong wellbeing. We can support programs such as “Best Start” to achieve results or launch a diaper program.
- The healthcare study group found that 130,000 Mainers are without health insurance under our current, dysfunctional system. Maine Hospital Association and 64% of physicians support a single-payer system. Support Maine AllCare to create legislative pressure. Oasis health clinic in Brunswick needs volunteers now.
- The income study group urges “scrapping the cap” on Social Security contributions after the \$118,000 ceiling via a letter writing campaign. We can all support the November ballot initiative on the minimum wage.
- Shocking statistics on incarceration were offered by members of the justice study group who attended meetings and conferences in Maine. Some good news: ME Prison Advocacy Coalition speaks for prisoners about humane changes. ME Council of Churches is focused on this issue and Maine’s juvenile justice system has become a model.
- The shelter & food study group focused on those in the most immediate and local need. 206,000 Mainers experience food insecurity, defined as not knowing where their next meal is coming from. There are numerous ways we can provide food, shelter and clothing, working with others or as a church.

One group highlighted the three ways we can work together on all these issues: 1) advocate 2) help plan local solutions and 3) provide direct service. The slide presentations will soon be made available on the UUCB website. From the home page, click on the link to “ending inequality.”
