On Homecoming Sunday, September 11, we will return to two services.

I n 1553, Michael Servetus was burned at the stake, per order of the court in Geneva. His crime? Several decades earlier he had published a book called *De trinitatis erroribus (On the Errors of the Trinity)* in which he concluded there was no Biblical evidence to support the existence of a trinity. Even worse, over the years he never recanted his position, but continued to argue it, even seeming to go out of his way to draw attention to his radical views.

His views were heretical for his time and, hence (it would seem), punishable by death at the stake. John Calvin was his public antagonist, not to mention the man who had had Servetus arrested and the chief prosecutor in the case. But the decision to put Servetus to death reflected the views of his time. In fact, before the trail ended, the court had ordered the written theologies of both Calvin and Servetus to be sent to other leading Protestant churches in Switzerland for comments. Those churches sided with Calvin's views.

But some protested Servetus's fate, feeling it wrong to punish heresy by death. Calvin wrote a defense of his

position. It was answered, famously, by Sebastian Castellio, who wrote, "to kill a man is not to protect a doctrine; it is but to kill a man. When the Genevans killed Servetus, they did not defend a doctrine; they but killed a man."

"If Servetus had wished to kill Calvin," Castellio continued, "the Magistrate would properly have defended Calvin. But when Servetus fought with reasons and writings, he should have been repulsed by reasons and writings." (http://www25.uua.org/uuhs/duub/ articles/michaelservetus.html)

What would Castellio think of our country's recent killing of Osama Bin Laden, I wonder? Perhaps he would have defended it – Bin Laden, after all, was responsible for heinous war crimes, with many more allegedly planned. Thus the punishment might seem to fit the crime and be defensible under the guise of protecting American citizens. Violence might justify violence, in other words.

On the other hand, I think Castellio might agree that killing Bin Laden did not kill his ideas or even his plans. The ideas continue to thrive, perhaps with pumped up vigor, as a result of the American action against Bin Laden.

I confess to my own uneasiness in the wake of Bin Laden's death. Yes, he probably continued to be a threat. Yes, his actions in the world were reprehensible. Yes, I would even ascribe the word "evil" to much of his behavior. But, to me, killing him is nothing to celebrate. I realize the Navy Seals may have felt they had no choice in the moment. Nonetheless, my heart fills with queasiness at the sight of Americans taking to the streets in high spirits in the wake of Bin Laden's killing. And I am appalled that we call such a killing "justice," instead of naming what it really is – revenge. I fear that we have added only more chapter to a seemingly endless cycle of violence, rather than turning the tide in any significant way.

What would it take to turn the tide? I believe we need to recognize that America's considerable military might and power allow us the privilege of ignoring our impact on others in the world. It's easy to say we are right we have the might to prove it! But the more courageous tack would be to cultivate some curiosity about others around us, most notably those who hate us. Why are Bin Laden's ideas popular among his countless followers? What it is that fills the madrassas with young people to be tutored in violence against America? Shouldn't we wonder about this?

I do not miss Bin Laden, nor do I mourn his death. But I do believe that more violence will not break the chain of violence. I do believe that "to kill a man is not to kill a doctrine; it is but to kill a man." At the same time, I believe true change is possible, but only with the advent of bold caring about living in community with all the world, including those who currently regard us as enemies. Until we learn to do that, it is as the poet says:

> Even a bullet fired in love of self or nation changes course returns to its author and does what all bullets do.

(The Agony of Violence, by Lamont B. Steptoe)

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A lively church with mission goals of "welcoming all" and "nurturing one another" takes both cheerfully and seriously the matter of attracting, welcoming, and integrating new participants. The UUCB attracts many visitors, and bringing them into community with long-time members and friends is one key to retaining vigor and building vitality.

Welcoming falls initially to our active and amiable Membership Committee. In all likelihood, the visitor's table at the rear of the sanctuary will be the first direct connection for newcomers. There, a representative of **A** the Membership Committee offers visitors a nametag and information. Visitors who are interested in further connection can offer brief information, or drop off a green "pew card", indicating whether they would like ٨ to receive the Parish Messenger or other mailings. Requests for permanent nametags are collected there, too, and tag preparation is another Membership Committee service. A Committee person follows up in a few weeks, extending the welcoming and nurturing process by checking whether people are getting the mailings and whether they've been able to meet other congregants.

Vital as Membership Committee members are, they can't and don't work in isolation. Their initiatives depend on support from the rest of the congregation – including the attentive and friendly greeters at the sanctuary door and welcoming congregants at coffee hour who engage those who seem to be new.

New this year: once a month, representatives of the Membership Committee and other welcoming folks chat with newcomers between

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services about the UU denomination and about our UUCB. Further, twice a year the Membership Committee supports Sylvia as she conducts a more in-depth orientation session for new (or sometimes also longtime) attendees who want to learn v more about UU practice or about the A UUCB. Often orientation session participants become new members or otherwise increase their commitment to service or participation in \mathbf{V} our UUCB community. In this way the Membership Committee offers a welcoming hand to visitors and provides the start-up processes that help interested newcomers increase their connection with the church.

But it "takes a whole congregation" to create community, and doing a truly outstanding job at it requires consistent congregational support. Everyone contributes – Committee members and the minister very centrally, of course. We hope you will personally and eagerly join in community-building by greeting newcomers with a welcoming word and a friendly smile. Don't worry about extending your welcome "mistakenly" to someone who has already been coming for a while -- it's ok and it's graciously creating 🔼 community.

We invite you to appreciate, celebrate, and join the Membership Committee's welcoming and nurturing efforts!

In May we addressed "courage"--a large topic--leading us to consider whether/how we have displayed courage at times, how we see it in others, what we think it is. In the group I facilitate, as we went deeper, we realized that "courage" is more multi-faceted than it first appears to be--and less clear-cut than it is often assumed to be.

Remember, all you have to do to try a Chalice Circle is to let Sylvia know you'd like to do so, and what your availability is. You don't have to commit to your circle until you've attended 3-4 times, and there's certainly no shame in a decision that "this isn't really for me."

We want to be a community where sharing our abundance is the norm, done with pleasure, where we can do community service for those in need and the environment. We do not need to be afraid. 
With a month left in the fiscal year, we still have a projected shortfall in the budget. Though our expenses continue to be less than the income, we still have obligations to meet, primarily in staff salaries and benefits. We need your continued help as we work to fill the gap.

Buy Hannaford gift cards for your groceries, use the CLYNK bags for recycling bottles, help with Bowdoin's *Give and Go* sale... AND fulfill your pledges.

Thanks to all to those who have pledged. It is critical for us to have these pledges to be able to budget for the next year. As of May 11th, we have \$160,935 in pledges. This is great and more than we have ever done on a first appeal. The projected budget for next year, as of this report, is \$244,634, if we are to continue to be a vibrant community with warm buildings, a full-time minister, a dynamic RE program, a well run church office and programs that enrich our spirit and serve the community.

Below is the graph of dollars pledged per <u>person</u>. So if you pledged \$3000 as a couple, the amount is divided by 2 and it appears on this graph as 2 in the column 1500-1599.

And as you can see we have 55 members who have not pledged this year. Please check with Elizabeth to be sure that she has a pledge form from you, especially if you are continuing with EFT deposits.

FROM THE BOARD

We are working hard on the budget for next year. As of now the pledges made for 2011-2012 are about \$36,000 less than we need for a balanced budget. Some pledges have not yet been returned, so we are hopeful that this gap will be closed before the end of June. If you still need to complete a pledge form, we will have them in the Community Room on Sundays or you can contact Elizabeth at the church office. Board members will be available after each service for the next three Sundays to show you the current budget draft and answer any questions you may have. We would welcome feedback, so please stay in the sanctuary for a few minutes and talk to us. Also, do not forget the **Annual Meeting scheduled for June 12, 2011 after the service and coffee hour**. We need everyone's input!

In addition, for about three months we have had a Board subcommittee reviewing bylaws from other UU Churches on membership and pledging. This work was not related to this year's pledge drive but was work we had on our goals for this year. We have found that many UU churches require payment of an annual pledge as part of membership. We have drafted a potential bylaws change for discussion at the annual meeting. We are sensitive in this economy to the fact that some people can not pledge even a nominal amount, and we do NOT want membership limited by personal finances. What we do know is that there is a fixed cost every year to pay our fair share per member to the Northern New England District and the UUA. We also know that our church runs almost entirely on the pledges and payments of its members. Please read the bylaws change proposal along with the old bylaws language and some examples of other UU church bylaws posted in the Community Room. If you have questions or concerns, please speak to any Board member.

We look forward to speaking to all members over the coming weeks and to lively discussion and participation on June 12.
