... Minister's Musings...

ne glorious August morning, I was the only person sitting on the second-story patio of a bed and breakfast in Boston, drinking my tea and eating my cereal, when one of the third floor windows opened wide and a 9-year-old boy stepped onto the fire escape and headed down to the patio.

"Good morning," I said.

"Hi," he replied, sauntering over.

"That's a great way to come down here," I remarked.

"That's how I come down here every morning," he offered.

I replied, "It's almost like something out of a thriller. A spy would creep down the fire escape like that."

He nodded, then added sagely, "But a robber would go UP the fire escape, not down." He then explained how a robber couldn't actually do that because the robber wouldn't be able to get from the street to the second-floor patio. He had it all figured out — and he was right; the patio was inaccessible from the street.

Pretty soon we were talking about all the important things like his grandparents, cruise ships, Old Ironsides, aquariums, jelly fish, leeches, amusement park rides, and super giant cockroaches. We talked for many minutes, simply enjoying the exchange of observations and ideas. (Mostly he exchanged ideas; mostly I listened. Children usually have much better ideas than adults, in my experience.)

At first I wondered a bit: Wouldn't his parents be worried about their little boy creeping down the fire escape and striking up conversations with strangers? But then I figured they probably weren't too worried. The bed and breakfast was one on Beacon Hill owned by the Unitarian Universalist Association. The few people around were fellow UUs, and I guessed the parents trusted their fellow UUs. That thought cheered me.

So I settled into the sheer pleasure of enjoying a young person's company – a somewhat rare opportunity in this age when we have all learned to be so cautious.

Don't get me wrong: Caution is both understandable and necessary. Children are easy targets, and, sadly, we all know there are some people who have poor boundaries and are unscrupulous. As I listened to the boy, though, I was harkening back to a time when our culture possessed a certain innocence about such things – or perhaps we were wearing blinders. When I was much younger, the flow of connection between unrelated adults and children was freer. So, on this day, I simply enjoyed a moment like many I have enjoyed in the past, when a child sensed I would listen and then chattered away, giving me a glimpse of a child's view of the world.


Pretty soon the boy's much shyer twin brother emerged on the scene and hovered nearby. Then the parents arrived, clutching coffee cups. Quickly we were chatting like old friends, talking about our respective UU churches and ideas about what would be fun to do on a vacation in Boston. The parents worried that perhaps their son might have been bothersome to me as I sat drinking my tea. I was able to reassure them quickly, but I suspect they didn't have a real sense of how honored I felt to have their son select me for his audience and conversation partner.

The truth is, that moment was a highlight of my summer in some respects. I felt so tickled watching the boy effect his "getaway" from the third floor. What a treat it was when he then opened up so readily to me and shared the kinds of wonderful, creative, and unencumbered thoughts only a child can have. The connection was brief, but, for me, refreshing. That day I had the opportunity to bless the ears I have for listening and to be grateful that I was on the patio when a child eager to discuss his thoughts arrived on the scene.

The Tom Sturtevant Chapter, #1 is the founding chapter of Veterans For Peace, a national organization founded in Maine in 1985. There are now over 120 chapters active in communities throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico, Vietnam and other nations. National conventions are held annually and members communicate

through quarterly newsletters as well as daily list-serve news, on line discussions groups and the national and chapter websites.

We draw on our personal experiences and perspectives gained as veterans to raise public awareness of the true costs and consequences of militarism and war - and to seek peaceful, effective alternatives. Our collective experience tells us wars are easy to start and hard to stop and that those hurt are often the innocent. Thus, other means of problem solving are necessary.

The organization includes veterans of all eras and duty stations, men and women, spanning the Spanish Civil War (1936-39), World War II, the Korean, Vietnam, Gulf and current Iraq and Afghanistan wars as well as other conflicts.

DOLLHOUSE RAFFLE



The Women's Alliance has a wonderful project you can support to help raise funds for the rebuilding of the church---a dollhouse raffle. The finding of the dollhouse is an interesting story in itself. Church member, Ellie Swanson, was out early one morning near her former home on Mere Point last summer when she spotted a discarded dollhouse in front of a nearby home. Knowing she couldn't fit it into her Prius and knowing it would be gone if she left and came back with a truck, she looked around for a solution. Alas, she saw a pickup truck coming along the road. She leaped in front of the young driver who "came to a screeching halt" and upon hearing Ellie's plight, agreed to transport the dollhouse down the road to Ellie's house. In return for the favor, he asked if his mother could come visit Ellie's heather garden. "I do love Mainiacs," Ellie says.

Ellie did much of the exterior renovating such as a new paint job and roof, window boxes complete with flowers, and other amenities. Another church member, Janet Alexander of Harpswell, took over from there. She and her husband, Sam, transported the dollhouse to their house and the interior renovations began. Janet scraped, painted, sanded, laid a wood floor made of tongue depressors, carpeted, wallpapered, decorated rooms, and sewed curtains and bed quilts. Her husband, Sam, did a bit of renovating as well to make the rooms cozier. In addition, many members of the Women's Alliance donated money, handmade rugs, a fireplace, and other accessories. Papa Geppetto's of Bath donated two rooms of furniture to help with the project. Dimensions of the dollhouse are 40"high, 24" deep, and 30 1/2" wide.

The dollhouse is now complete and will be raffled off at the UUCB's auction November 3, 2012 at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Brunswick. You do not need to be present to win. Winner must pick up dollhouse within 2 weeks of drawing

Smile and Say Hello to All!

ave read "Welcome" page on the inside of our Sunday Bulletin cover? Here's a sampling: "We welcome every honest seeker of a more humane and meaningful life; we are open to all who accept the democratic principle in human relationships and who share our concern for the individual and society and for the quality of life reflected in each. We welcome all who are searching and questioning, those who would be stimulated by further growth, those who seek to live lives of justice and compassion, and those who are hurting or bereaved."

We welcome all who come through our doors. However, when it comes to basic hospitality, sometimes we find discrepancies between these ideas and our practices of hospitality. Our congregation has made wonderful efforts to close the gap between ideas and practices of hospitality to become a truly welcoming community. Occasionally we need to conduct a bit of church business during coffee hour, and we remain involved with committee members. Or we want to chat with folks we already have connections with. This is natural, but we need to make a point of connecting with those we don't know.

In his article, "Hand in Hand: Religious Hospitality," UU World, Spring 2012, Peter Morales wrote about feeling welcome when visiting a UU church. He said that a friend visiting a UU congregation was not greeted, sat alone during the service, and was not spoken to during coffee hour. She approached another person who was alone and discovered this person was also a visitor. Even in Morales' own church ten years ago, guests were not always greeted or connected in conversation although the congregation proclaimed to be a welcoming community. Peter said, "The difference between our self-image of hospitality and the reality of our behavior was shocking." His congregation took measures to revitalize hospitality in their church.

Here at UUCB we have followed this model to make hospitality a priority. We have a warm and outgoing Membership Committee whose members are present at the Visitor Table each Sunday.
