## ... MINISTER'S MUSINGS ...

nd so the summer is upon us.

I believe it important UUCB think and present itself as a 12-month congregation – a departure from a typical UU model, in which the minister is gone for most of the summer. If our message is worth broadcasting 10 months of the year, it is worth it during the other two months, too. Moreover, Brunswick is in a summer tourist region. Folks who cannot be here during the rest of the year come during the summer. If I were gone for the whole summer, I would never see some of them.

Consequently, I will take half of my break during the summer and the rest during the winter. I will be gone from **July 20 to August 20**. While I am away, Church Office Administrator Shirley Bernier will know how to reach a minister on call in the event of an emergency. If Shirley is unavailable, please contact a member of the Board for assistance.

We have actually been moving toward this model for some time. In the old days, our congregation closed during the summer. But we began to hold lay-led summer services in the years before I arrived on the scene. Most summers, I have returned to work in mid-August, a couple of weeks before what some consider "the beginning of the church year." This summer I will simply increase the number of weeks I work during the summer. I plan to take the rest of my break time in January.

I know some in the congregation like to take the summer off from church, and that's OK. Only you can determine what you need from church. If you take time off, we will miss you, but we will be here when you return.

In the meantime, we will still be the safe, welcoming, feisty, creative community we are during the rest of the year. The human needs for community, contemplation, live music, singing, healing, inspiration, and quiet do not disappear from people's lives just because it's summer. Nor does the desire for many to turn our focus to Awe, our hearts to Love, and our minds to the deepest questions of Mystery. The need for a safe place to learn what it means to grow into our best selves is not seasonal. Too, the vicissitudes of life and death roll right along, regardless of the current calendar page.

So I invite you to think of UUCB as a 12-month congregation. We're here. And, when you aren't off on that long awaited camping trip or entertaining Aunt Tillie, Uncle Johnie, and the triplets, we hope you will join us on Sundays.

Have a wonderful summer – and have some of it in church!

## **CHARITIES WITH SOUL FOR 2014 - 2015**



Here are the choices for the Charities with Soul for 2014 - 2015, as selected by 60 votes of the congregation:

**Access Health** — Removes barriers to healthy choices – e.g. food stamp access at farmers' markets - promoting healthy choices for all community members in Sagadahoc County, Brunswick and Harpswell.

**Boys to Men** - Seeks to reduce interpersonal violence, specifically male violence against women and girls, and supports the development of emotionally fluent, civically engaged boys.

**Chans Hospice** - Trains volunteers to assist families with a dying member, who are also served by social workers and doctors working as a team.

**Coastal Humane Society** - - an animal rescue and adoption "no kill" shelter in Brunswick.

**Family Planning Association of Maine** - - Offers reproductive health care and primary care to men and women in the State.

**ILAP** - Provides free and low-cost immigration information and legal assistance to low-income Maine residents.

**Keep ME Warm -** an emergency fuel assistance program with the goal of helping Maine people stay safe, warm and secure in the winter.

**Natural Resources Council of Maine -** Works statewide for clean air, healthy waters, and safeguards for Maine's people and wildlife.

**Restorative Justice Project of Mid Coast Maine -** Assists with rehabilitation to those entering and released from Maine prisons.

**Tedford Housing -** Works to end homelessness in Maine by providing, in collaboration with others, shelter, housing and services to those in need.

Note: Midcoast Hunger Prevention and Habitat for Humanity/7 Rivers Maine are always in our roster of Charity with Soul organizations.

#### GORDON BOK!

## Saturday, July 19th at 7:00 p.m. UU Church of Brunswick

To raise funds for the 2014-15 church operating budget, the Fundraising Events Committee has hired Maine's premiere folksinger, Gordon Bok to perform a concert in our new church building on July 19th. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased at the church office or at Gulf of Maine Books

"And while my hands are steady, while my eyes are good, I will carve the music of the wind into the wood," Gordon Bok sings on his "Apples in the Basket" CD. Thankfully for us all, his hands are still steady holding the multiple instruments he plays in concert, a six string guitar, a twelve string guitar (on which his mastery is particularly notable), a viola de gamba, and various whistles.

Perhaps not as well known to many who love his music, Gordon is also, with his steady hands and eyes that have not dimmed, an accomplished wood carver, and pictures of some of his carvings grace the covers of several of the CD's he has released.

Gordon Bok's musical legacy has been carved into the memories of music lovers in Maine, across the country, and in numerous foreign countries, a unique legacy of awe inspiring breadth, depth and diversity, taking listeners on a rich journey across multiple continents and centuries, from the Australian outback to 16th century England, and especially, back

to the Maine coast. For it is Maine and its rugged coast that is his true spiritual home, and nothing could be truer than the observation in the Brunswick Times–Record that "If the sea had a voice with which to sing, it would be the voice of Gordon Bok."



## **JUD CASWELL!**

As an added bonus UUCB's own singer/ songwriter Jud Caswell will be doing the opening set for the Bok Concert. Jud hit the folk scene in 2004 with a long string of wins at some of the most prestigious songwriting contests in the country. He has played festivals and concerts from New England to Texas and Oregon, and charted with his 2007 release "Blackberry Time." Jud is a favorite at many of the local venues, especially at Byrnes Irish Pub.

## FOR YOUR SUMMER REFLECTION: A CHALICE CIRCLE FOR YOU NEXT YEAR?

#### FROM KAREN FOLEY, UUCB AFFILIATED MINISTER

For those who don't already know, I coordinate our Chalice Circle program, taking over that role from Sylvia last fall. This year, the fifth for Chalice Circles, has been a good one—six circles with seven dedicated facilitators (one with co-facilitators). They tell me that people are already asking, "When will new Chalice Circles start up? I want to be in one!" That is wonderful news!

Answer: you can sign up to participate in a Chalice Circle starting in September. A sign-up form will appear in the September newsletter. Current Chalice Circles will continue to meet through October. New ones will form and begin to meet in November (instead of October as they did this year). It's hoped that his later start will give more of our newcomers—so many people begin attending church in early fall—a chance to participate. Each year it's a whole new set of Circles, reconfigured, so no Circle is replicated from year to year. (Yes, this means you have to sign up to be in one next year, even if you're already in one!)

Chalice Circles are an adult religious education program, a curriculum designed specifically for Unitarian Universalist seekers. They allow us to know each other on a deeper level than we can manage in coffee hour, or even most "normal conversation". A Chalice Circle is a chance to know others more deeply and closely, and to explore the experience of your heart and spirit. Circles meet once a month for 12 months with the guidance of a facilitator. Each month, all Circles engage the same topic, which changes monthly.

Maybe you're in a Chalice Circle currently and would like to continue; maybe you previously partook and didn't this year but would like to resume. Maybe you've never tried a Chalice Circle and are curious. Watch the August *Parish Messenger* for more about Chalice Circles, and the September issue for a sign-up form!
