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#### October 5 Animal Blessing Sunday

#### October 19 "What Justice"

Did you know most law schools don't teach courses in justice? Law students study litigation and statutes, but not justice. That means judges have no particular training in justice, yet they are the ones meting it out! Enter the community of ordinary folks who may not know much about law, but who understand as much about justice as the people operating our justice system. To-day special guest Fred Van Liew, Director of the Restorative Justice Institute of Maine, joins Rev. Stocker to explore restorative justice. "It's interesting to think of justice as local, which it is and must be," he writes. What does that mean for us? Music by Nell Britton and the Choir, under the direction of Heidi Neufeld.

### October 26 at 10 a.m. "Heifer International--Changing lives."

Gretchen Kamilewicz is leading the service. Since 1944, Heifer International has been changing the lives of people in Maine, the United States, and many countries around the world. Gretchen will talk about Heifer's beginnings, show a short video on projects around the world, and give her own experiences meeting with projects participants and going on a study tour to Poland.

# ... MINISTER'S MUSINGS ...

e are finally launched. With our building officially dedicated, we now settle down to the business of being a congregation on the move in a figurative way, as opposed to one that is literally moving into a new building. This is an exciting and tender time for us, as we learn how to sail new seas. What adventures await us?

At the Building Dedication, we had the opportunity to look back, remembering our journey, and lifting up the building tool kit that helped us through our time of homelessness and transition. The elements of that tool kit? Love, patience, cooperation, dreams, creativity, generosity, hope, and gratitude – wonderful tools to have in any tool kit.

We gave away 100% of our offering that day, splitting it among three organizations that had particular meaning in the context of our recovery and rebuilding: the Brunswick Fire Department for their work in keeping the community safe, the Tedford Shelter because we know what it is to lose a home suddenly, and the UU Trauma Ministry, which helped us so much in the early days of recovery. Altogether, the offering brought in more than \$1500, so each of those organizations will receive around \$500 from us.



And, of course we looked forward, too. UUA President Peter Morales urged us to be both a sanctuary, where souls are nurtured and fed, and a base camp for the work that needs doing in the world. Jud Caswell's song, composed just for the occasion, brought our bell's inscription forward into the future: "Ring joy and peace to the world." Nicole's message to the children asked us to consider what kind of imprint our distant descendants will discover and celebrate. With those forward-looking messages, we have begun to turn the corner to the next phase of our congregational history. I look forward to discovering, with you, just what direction we will take.

But right at this moment, I want to pause and say a hearty thank you to everyone who helped to make the Building Dedication so special. Of course, that means thanking the people involved in planning the event, conducting the service, and offering the reception – itself a voluminous cast - but it also means thanking everyone both inside and outside the congregation who made the building itself possible. We are indeed blessed to be together and to be held by such a robust circle of love. May we always remember to return that love back to the world in our dreaming and doing.

### **WORKING FOR JUSTICE**

# WORKING FOR JUSTICE INVITES YOU TO JOIN OUR STEERING GROUP:

About Us: The Working for Justice (WfJ) Steering Group is charged to create, encourage and support programming that relates to our congregation's chosen social justice ministry of preventing hate and prejudice. We work to engage the congregation as well as the wider community in a collaborative programming effort. Guiding our work of social action is a conviction about making a difference, however small, in the lives of others and in our own.

#### Plans for this church year (2014-15):

- Restorative Justice a philosophy and movement that emphasizes responsibility and restitution for wrongdoing rather than punishment, the approach which underpins our current criminal justice system. Our UUCB October 19 Sunday worship service will invite us to reflect on issues of restorative justice. Collaborative planning meetings will follow with the Restorative Justice Institute of Maine to explore the possibility of some kind of restorative justice programming in Brunswick.
- Other: WfJ also supports the UUCB programs of Charities with Soul, Guest at Your Table, and MUUSAN (see below). In addition, our steering group will respond to ideas about social

justice programs which align with our ministry of preventing hate and prejudice.

#### 2013-2014 Church Year Programs:

- "Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness". Michelle Alexander's book, a searing account of the disproportionate incarceration of African-American men. spurred the community forum on criminal justice system reform with St. Paul's Episcopal Church, First Parish UCC, and Bowdoin College last April. That collaboration continues as we explore the possibility of restorative justice programming in the Brunswick area.
  - A Culture of Violence. In response to the December 14, 2012 Sandy Hook shootings, a task force of interested members and friends, under the umbrella of Working for Justice, organized a community forum on gun violence and the larger culture of violence that spark such tragedies. Among the panelists at the forum was Drew Wing, then-Executive Director of Boys to Men. Drew joined us again at the UUCB Sunday service on Father's day to speak on the culture of violence and its influence in the development of boys' lives.
- Color of Community a group of young immigrants in Portland who reach out to the community with their "sacred stories," which speak of unimaginable loss and tragedy in their homelands and their resolve and hope for a new life in this country. Color of Community offered their "sacred stories" and a world prayer at a service in 2013. The congregation enjoyed a celebration of songs, dance, and food after that service; and later heard their prayers of hope for our congregation at the first service in our new building in April.
- month's collection plate is split with a non-profit organization, nominated and voted on by the congregation. WfJ oversees the annual nomination and selection process.
- Guest at Your Table an annual fund-raising and education program that supports the human rights work of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC).
- MUUSAN (Maine Unitarian Universalist Social Action Network) brings the UU voice to the State Capitol by providing a lobbying arm for UU Churches in Maine. Our Steering Group is represented on MUUSAN's monthly meetings.

# **GREEN SANCTUARY OUTREACH**

Our Green Sancrtuary Committee is participating with St. Paul's Episcopal Earth Care Commission in the Window Dresser Program that saves oil and helps to heat homes. The program was started by the Midcoast Green Collaborative of Rockland, ME where it has become popular.

The program provides people with high quality window inserts that reduce heat loss in homes. The estimated savings for single pane windows a year is \$202 for electric heat, \$135 for oil, and \$69 for wood heat. The savings for double pane windows is a bit less, but still worthwhile

A total of 251 windows have been measured in the Brunswick Area by volunteers from the program. The measurements for each window are carefully identified and sent to Midcoast Green Collaborative where materials are cut to the exacting measurements, packaged

together, and labeled to fit each unique house and window. On October 5th all the parts bundled together separately for each of the 251 windows will arrive at St. Paul's.

During Oct. 6-9, a group of 50 volunteers will be needed to assemble the frames and wrap and tape the tough clear poly-olefin plastic to both sides of the newly assembled frame. Please mark your calendars for the week of October 6 to join the volunteers assembling these light-weight, easy to install, window inserts that will add to the comfort of many and the saving of heat loss and fuel consumption.

# **WARM THY NEIGHBOR**

#### AN EMERGENCY HEATING ASSISTANCE SERVICE OF TEDFORD HOUSING FOR THE GREATER BRUNSWICK AREA

Tedford Housing is seeking volunteers to help keep households warm this heating season. Warm Thy Neighbor has been strongly supported by the church community since its establishment in 2005 when established by Sally Smith.

Tedford is seeking volunteers to work a half day or more in Brunswick, typically the same time period each week, or every other week, from mid-November to the end of March. Tedford will train you in the application and heating assistance coordination processes and will have staff available to you during your period of service. Specific tasks include taking phone calls for assistance and screen calling households, meet with applicant households, take applications and review required documentation, contact par-



ticipating fuel companies and order fuel deliveries, and coordinating with Tedford Housing staff for billing and data recording requirements.

# MAINE UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST STATE ADVOCACY NETWORK

Lynn Ellis, congregational liaison for UUCB to MUUSAN, attended the September 13th meeting. There had been a hiatus of meetings over the summer but MUUSAN was, by no means, inactive as you will read in the following report from MUUSAN's latest newsletter. The primary issues discussed at the meeting included 1) finding funding sources to sustain MUUSAN 2) Increase presence on facebook 3) MUUSAN is partnering with UUSC on the National Minimum Wage legislation and the ongoing partnership with Maine Citizens for Clean Elections. The next meeting with be held November 8th at the UU Augusta Church. Stay tuned for more information. At the time of this writing UUs from all over Maine will be preparing to head for NYC for the Climate March, including at least two from UUCB.

### National #WageOutrage Campaign Urges Higher Minimum Wage for Maine and U.S.

Maine activists and a national #WageOutrage campaign are turning to Senator Susan Collins, asking her help to bring the Minimum Wage Fairness Act to the Senate floor for a vote. Harkin's bill, if passed, would raise the minimum wage to \$10.10 an hour nationally. Advocates are reaching out to Mainers asking them to call Senator Collins and urge her support in making a higher minimum wage a reality.

The national #WageOutrage effort is co-sponsored by the UUSC, and in Maine is co-sponsored by MUUSAN.

UUSC's national #WageOutrage campaign is calling on lawmakers via activist outreach and social media to raise the federal minimum wage to at least \$10.10 an hour, and the minimum wage for tipped workers from \$2.13 an hour to 70% of the hourly minimum wage.

So far, conservative Senate leaders have refused to allow a vote on increasing the current \$7.25 hourly minimum. In April, the Senate bill was filibustered. Senator Collins voted not to end the filibuster and has since been working on a compromise bill.

"We are now encouraging her to vote yes to bring the Senate bill to the floor for a vote. We acknowledge Senator Collins for taking steps to raise the wage above the poverty line for a family of three, and that she has floated the possibility of a \$9.00 minimum wage nationwide," says Kara Smith, UUSC senior associate for activism and mobilization nationally. Yet, we also encourage her to reconsider an increase to at least \$10.10, not only for Maine residents but for 28 million workers across the U.S.

UUSC's Smith said that according to the Economic Policy Institute it is estimated that some 121,000 workers in Maine would get a raise if the minimum wage were increased.

The #WageOutrage initiative puts emphasis on economic justice for women in Maine and nationally. In Maine, more than six in 10 of its minimum wage earners are women. 62 percent of those have no partner supplementing their income.

"The fall session for Congress is a short one before the mid-term elections. We trust that the Senate will decide firmly and quickly on the side of struggling workers and their families."

#### **MAINE FACTS:**

- 12% of all children in Maine have a parent who stands to get a raise if the minimum wage is hiked to at least \$10.10.
- Almost six months' Fair Market rent for a two-bedroom apartment, according to the White House, or 33 weeks of groceries based on the USDA's Thrifty Food Plan
- Maine's \$7.50 an hour minimum wage and its \$3.75 tipped hourly wage are higher than the national rates, but according to "Families Out of Balance," a new report from the Alliance for a Just Society, Maine's workers are falling farther behind.
- The report indicates that, for a single adult with no children working full-time in Maine, a "living wage" is \$15.82 an hour.

# **DEADLINE COMING FOR CHALICE CIRCLE SIGN-UP!**

Chalice Circles are small groups who meet monthly for listening and sharing on meaningful topics. It's a wonderful way to connect with others in a deeper way than the usual social occasion. The past three newsletters have explained various aspects of Chalice Circles. This time the focus is on their *intent and process*, which is not always fully understood ahead of time.

In Chalice Circles we covenant to listen in silence and wait until a speaker is done speaking to begin speaking (Circles use some form of "announcing" intention to speak, perhaps a gesture, or a "talking stick" or other object). Silence, when it occurs, is enriching and beneficial,

allowing us to fully take in what the other says. This is very countercultural!

We covenant not to engage in cross-talk (direct response by one person to another), but to simply hold in respect and care what the other has said. When we speak we don't address our remarks to individuals but "speak into the circle." We may agree or disagree with the speaker, but we speak from our own perspective and our own experience rather than critique or argue a point of view. We so not offer advice unless it is asked for. All of this is counter-cultural too!

As you may be picking up here,

Chalice Circles are not "discussions" or times to share our knowledge, not even a "conversation" in the usual way of conversation in our culture. They are an opportunity for intentional, deep sharing from our own perspectives and experiences, an opportunity to hear others in a way we don't usually get to—and to *be heard* in a way we don't usually get to be heard! It can be transformative to be heard with genuine respect and care.

To be in a Chalice Circle for the coming church year (starting in November), whether or not you've been in one the past year, you must have your sign-up form in the church office by Tuesday, October 7. It is


You will have the opportunity to sign our Membership Book although this is not the goal of the course. Those who do want to become members need to sign. New members will be recognized during the church service on November 16.




