SUNDAY SERVICES AT 10 A.M.

**January 4. “Active Hope.”** Rev. Stocker continues her reflections on the work of Joanna Macy, exploring how to live in the world without going crazy. Music by Jud Caswell.

The service, led by Louise Gephart, Stephanie Bernier and friends, will include the sharing of songs that move us, and congregational singing. Jean Lay will play the hymns.

have to say, I've never been really into New Year's celebra-  
tions. January 1<sup>st</sup> has always  
seemed so arbitrary to me. There are  
other times of the year that seem to  
make so much more sense to me as an  
appropriate date for a new year. Take  
the vernal equinox for example. It's  
the beginning of spring and symbolizes  
rebirth. Perfect time for new begin-  
nings and a new year, right? So, I  
decided to find out why January 1<sup>st</sup>  
is the start of the New Year.

Come to find out, when Julius Cae-  
sar decided to consult the most fa-  
mous astronomers and mathemati-  
cians of his time to adjust the early  
Roman to stay more in sync with the  
sun, he decided that January 1<sup>st</sup>  
would be the beginning of the New  
Year in honor of Janus- the god of  
beginnings whose two faces allowed  
him to simultaneously look back to  
the past and into the future. This is  
new information to me, apparently I  
wasn't paying attention during any  
of the Roman and Greek mythology  
units in grade school.

I like the idea of taking time to look  
both back to the past and into the  
future. It's important to take stock  
of past events; to look back and dis-  
cover our history and heritage and  
to carry on the traditions and rituals  
that have been important to us and to  
our familial and religious forebears, to  
celebrate our accomplishments, and  
learn from our mistakes. And at the

same time, it's also important to  
keep the future in mind: to be  
open to new possibilities, to em-  
brace (or at least accept) change,  
to find reason for hope, and to  
continue to learn and grow. In a  
sense, this is what we are doing  
in RE this year. In learning about  
Unitarian Universalist identity  
and history, we are taking stock  
of our religious past and discover-  
ing how it fits in to our present  
and future. We have the oppor-  
tunity to explore both the amaz-  
ing accomplishments and the  
mistakes in our UU religious his-  
tory and to see how traditions,  
principles, and sources fit into  
our lives both today and in the  
future. This New Year, let the  
two faces of Janus remind us of  
the importance of both the past  
and the future. Here's to remem-  
bering, learning, and growing  
together in our UUCB communi-  
ty.

## ... MINISTER'S MUSINGS ...

For nearly three years our congregation had a definite and obvious focus: recovering from the fire that destroyed our church building, figuring out what to do next, and moving forward. If you step inside our remarkable new building, you can see what happens when we focus on making something happen. Our building is a tangible representation of our commitment, creativity, and passion. When we work together, we are a mighty force!

Now we are home. We have marveled, given thanks for the stunning generosity of so many who helped to make it all happened, congratulated ourselves, and celebrated our great feat. Now the time has come to focus on something else. But what?

That's where the Board comes in. In their wisdom, they have created a special, facilitated workshop on Saturday, January 17, from 9 to 2, during which

we will explore what feels right to be our primary focus now. At the end of the workshop, we will have chosen something for the whole congregation to vote on that we imagine will drive our work together for the next two or three years. We imagine a theme broad enough to touch all sectors of our mission statement ("to be a spiritual community, to welcome all, to nurture one another, to work for justice, and to care for the earth"). In addition, we hope the focus will provide a lens through which we can plan worship, education for all ages, and outreach. And, the focus will help us to prioritize the actions we take on the long range plan we have created together.

This will be important work in the life of our congregation. You might say the work we take up at the workshop will represent our

shared ministry. I encourage all of you – whether you've been part of the congregation for decades or recently started attending – to take part so that we will have a broad representation of ages, interests, and thoughts present. (Details about how to sign up for childcare are elsewhere in this newsletter.)

The workshop will be led by Rev. Sue Gabrielson, minister of the Sanford congregation and one of our district consultants. I have known Sue ever since we attended seminary together. She is one remarkable, accomplished, and inspiring person. We will be in good hands with her at the helm. So, please mark your calendars and plan to attend. I look forward to seeing you there!

### WARM THY NEIGHBOR PROGRAM

Tedford Housing sponsors an important community service called WARM THY NEIGHBOR (WTN), an emergency fuel assistance program in the Mid-Coast for individuals and families who do not qualify for federal heating assistance.

The program is designed to be flexible to meet the needs of people who fall between the cracks and may have special circumstances. The population is comprised of single parents, seniors living on fixed incomes, and people with disabilities. Last year, 290 households were served.

#### Program History

The program began through the efforts of area churches who received several requests from people in need of emergency fuel. A coordinated effort was

put forth and funds were raised from public donations. Founding Director, Sallie Smith spearheaded the program by personally assisting each client and organizing fund raising to support the mission. October 1, 2010 Tedford Housing assumed the program as one of their homeless prevention programs.

#### Communities Served

WTN serves people from Brunswick, Topsham, Harpswell, Orrs and Bailey Islands, Durham, Bowdoin, Bowdoinham, Lisbon and Lisbon Falls.

#### How is the Program Funded?

The program is funded 100% by community donations. Your donations make a direct impact to a family or individual in need. A warm home may be just the beginning to solving much more serious and life threatening

## TIPS FOR A HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

UU's Vegan Sunday Group encourages a healthy lifestyle by focusing on a plant-based diet to promote:

-  **Environmental Change:** Over half of greenhouse gasses leading to climate change are a direct result of animal agriculture, according to the Worldwatch Institute ([www.worldwatch.org/files/pdf/Livestock%20and%20Climate%20Change.pdf](http://www.worldwatch.org/files/pdf/Livestock%20and%20Climate%20Change.pdf))
-  **Improved Health:** Many chronic diseases can be avoided or even reversed by eating a plant-based diet and eliminating animal products.
-  **Animal Rights:** Animals suffer greatly in the process of "production" as well as slaughter. See Peter Singer's Animal Liberation for details. Dr. Singer is Professor of Bioethics at Princeton University.
-  **Sustainability:** Consuming billions of animals annually for food is unsustainable. If we all ate a plant-based diet, we could grow enough food for everyone on the planet while vastly improving the environment.
