#### ... MINISTER'S MUSINGS ...

am aware that rumors are circulating throughout the congregation about my sabbatical.. Although my plans are not fully formed yet, I want to take this opportunity to let you know what I know so far.

A minister's sabbatical is a time for thought, renewal, exploration, and spiritual deepening. The UUA asks congregations to allow ministers to accrue one month of sabbatical time for every year worked, not to be taken before four months have accrued, and not to include more than six months of sabbatical time in any given year.

That may seem like a lot of time (it certainly seems that way to me, at least), but it is for a good reason. I can remember the days before sabbaticals were normally offered as part of a minister's package. When I was a child, ministers usually left my church after rather short tenures, because they burned out and were not able to recharge their batteries in any way other than leaving. That changed when the congregation started offering sabbaticals to their ministers. It turns out to be very important to step away from the steady requirements of ministry and turn one's sights to new vistas, occupy one's mind with new ideas and experiences, and - quite simply rest for a while.

When our church burned, the UUA Trauma Ministry advised me not to take a sabbatical until at least a year after we were in our new building. For the most part, I heeded their advice, although, with the Board's recommendation and encouragement, I took a month of sabbatical time last February.

By June I will have accumulated seven months of sabbatical time. It's time to take a real sabbatical to recharge my batteries and explore some new things. The Board has approved my time away as follows: In total I will take six months of sabbatical time in two chunks, starting this coming fall. Combining that sabbatical time with my normal vacation/study time will make for two four-month breaks.

From October 2015 through the end of December 2015, I will be on sabbatical, followed by one month (January 2016) of vacation/study time. I return to work for February, March, and half of April 2016.

From April 15, 2016, to July 15, 2016, I will be on sabbatical, followed again by one month of study and vacation time. I will return to work on August 15, 2016.

What will I be doing while I am away? I know for certain I will be attending the World Parliament of Religions in Salt Lake City in October. The focus of their meeting will be compassion. Keynote speakers will include the Dalai Lama and Karen Armstrong (whose work has inspired my current sermon series on compassion). Other plans are still underway. I am mulling over several ideas and will share my plans with you as they develop.

What will happen at the church while I am gone? The Board is in the process of creating a Sabbatical Task Force to make plans for the congregation. More on that as information develops.

The Worship Committee has already created a task force to start planning worship services. Some of those services will be covered by area UU ministers. We cover for each other during sabbatical times. When I take a Sunday in a colleague's pulpit during his or her sabbatical, that is, that colleague will come preach at our church for one of my sabbatical Sundays.

Some of the worship services will be conducted by special speakers the Worship Committee invites. And some of the services will be covered by lay preachers. (That could mean you. Think about it: Do you have something you would like to suggest to the Worship Committee?) The Worship Committee is already starting to fill the Sundays. Worship leaders and topics will be announced in the monthly newsletter as usual.

The Pastoral Care Associates will continue to offer their ministry of deep listening. Ministerial backup will be provided as needed, especially for funeral or memorial services or acute pastoral emergencies.

Once the congregational plans are made, we will publish a short booklet to let you know whom to contact for various needs and duties.

I know from experience as a parishioner that some can find it a little unsettling to have their minister gone for a long period of time. But I also have seen how sabbaticals help both ministers and congregations to grow and deepen in their spirituality and commitments to each other and the larger work we undertake together. I am happy to answer any of your questions. As plans become firmer, I will let you know details.

## Q: What's happening with our new congregational focus on END INQUALITY?

**A:** The Nominating Committee is hard at work putting together a leadership team to get us started. We hope to have about five people, representing both long-time and new members, young and old, parents and singles, men and women. Names will be announced as soon as the team is complete.

#### Q: What will the leadership team be responsible for?

- **A:** The Board has developed a tentative charge, understanding that it may be fine-tuned as the group comes together and begins to dig in. As it stands, the charge reads:
  - Create a clear statement of purpose for the congregational focus to End Inequality
  - Capitalize on the UUA Congregational Study/Action Issue resources
  - Listen carefully to and sort through ideas raised by the congregation
  - Work with the Church Council and various committees to coordinate study and action activities within the UUCB community
  - Facilitate and/or explore for new opportunities for collaboration with groups outside of UUCB
  - Communicate effectively and regularly with the congregation as a whole about opportunities and progress of ongoing activities

### Q: If I have an idea for this group, who should I give it to?

A: It is anticipated that the team will set up an email account to solicit ideas and comments, as the Building Team did. Until then, suggestions may be sent to Board Chair Cindy Parker (cindyparker48@gmail.com)

#### Q: Anything else while we're waiting?

A: The Long-Range Planning Committee has encouraged each standing committee, as well as the Board, to look at the ideas brainstormed a year ago with this new focus in mind. Some committees have already found ideas on this list for programs and initiatives that fit our new focus and have started planning!

## Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network

Members representing 8 different congregations attended the Maine UU State Advocacy Network meeting on Saturday, Feb 7<sup>th</sup>. Jim Spicer attended for UUCB. Lynn Ellis is submitting the notes to the Parish Messenger.

After a brief business meeting, including discussion of a grant David Wilcox and Mary Ann Larson are writing and a vote to elect Cush Anthony to the steering committee, we broke into three issue groups.

#### **HEALTH CARE:**

MUUSAN continues to partner with Cover Maine Now and Maine AllCare as the impact of not accepting federal funds to expand Medicaid is starting to hurt people and institutions. MUUSAN will participate in the Cover Maine Now conference calls and we are learning more about the Health Care is a Human Right campaign. The Ellsworth UU Church is hosting a weekend program Saturday, April 25th and Sunday, April 26th presented by Maine AllCare to raise public awareness for the need for universal health care. The Allen Avenue UU Church developed a worship service focused on healthcare, which they are taking on the road to Ellsworth and other places. If you are interested in having them present a service at your church, contact Carol Larson at MUUSAN@augustauu.org. If your church is willing to host an information session on the benefits of expanding Medicaid or Health Care is a Human Right, contact MUUSAN@augustauu.org. We will be watching for bills to be submitted to the legislature and will send an alert when there is action to take.

#### STRENGTHENING DEMOCRACY:

Members of MUUSAN collected signatures in a number of regions for ballot initiatives with our partners: Maine Citizens for Clean Elections (MCCE) and Ranked Choice Voting Maine (RCV Maine). The MCCE question will be on the ballot in 2015 while RCV is waiting until 2016. We can support both campaigns by organizing workshops, forums, and house parties to ensure grassroots understanding of the importance of these two initiatives. The democracy group also discussed how the Trans Pacific Partnership spans both the democracy group and the climate group in its impact of big money control over our political system. We plan to invite a speaker on Ranked Choice Voting for our next meeting.

#### **CLIMATE CHANGE:**

Chair Melanie Lanctot was unable to attend but sent this information:

The Natural Resources Council of Maine is gearing up for the new legislative session. Their priorities include solar energy promotion and lakes protection. Bookmark NRCM's <u>Bill Tracking website</u> to learn the status of bills affecting the environment. Their Citizen's Action Day is April 7<sup>th</sup>, a great opportunity to speak directly to your legislators about matters of greatest concern to you.

#### What is Guest at Your Table (GAYT)?

GAYT is an annual, denomination-wide fundraising and education program that supports UUSC's human rights work.

#### What is UUSC (Unitarian Universalist Service Committee)?

UUSC is a 501©(3) nonprofit, associate member organization of the Unitarian Universalist Association that advances human rights in more than a dozen countries around the world through grassroots collaboration. Grounded in UU values, UUSC is nonsectarian and open to all.

#### What is this year's Guest at Your Table theme?

This year's GAYT theme is food sustainability: ensuring that people have sufficient, affordable, healthy, and culturally appropriate food to eat and that it's produced in a way that doesn't damage the environment. This year's *Stories of Hope* (booklets passed out with collection boxes on March 1) highlight projects in Haiti, Kenya and Honduras – efforts for economic justice, educational opportunities for children, community responses to climate change and other advancements for human rights.

#### Why is it called Guest at Your Table?

This program introduces you to grassroots leaders around the world who are advancing human rights and who are supported by UUSC. You are encouraged to "invite" those leaders to your table - into your community or your home - as "guests", by sharing their stories and contributing to their work through the UUSC. We are providing you with a box, decorated by our own RE children, into which you can put your contributions as you "share" each meal with your guests. We encourage you to talk together about the meaning of contributing to work that furthers human rights and sustainability.

### How does the UUCB congregation contribute to Guest at Your Table?

On March 1, the Story for All during the service will focus on the work of UUSC, and you will receive a collection box, decorated by our RE children along with a *Stories of Hope* booklet. Over the next 3 weeks, read and discuss these stories as well as other stories you know about people coming together to work for a more just and sustainable world. At each meal put your contributions to UUSC into the box. At the end of 3 weeks, count the money in your box and write a check to UUSC with GAYT in the memo line. We will collect the checks on Sunday, March 22 during the church service. (If you cannot be there on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, you can bring or mail your contribution to the church office to be turned in as part of the UUCB GAYT contribution to UUSC.)



## REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE, THE UUA, AND WHY YOU SHOULD BE INTERESTED MARCH 15TH

As you may know, every two years a new study/action issue is chosen by the vote of people attending the denomination's annual meeting, the Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly. The study/action issue selected at the 2012 General Assembly was Reproductive Justice.

The four year process for final approval for adopting an issue passes through several phases having to do with education, advocacy, review, consensus. and finally, implementation. An essential component is study, often with the help of a curriculum provided by the UUA to member churches. The final stage for approval, or not, of the Reproductive Justice issue, will be determined by a vote at this spring's General Assembly in Portland, OR.



Our church has not participated in the study, review and consensus stages of the approval process because of the immense challenges of building our new church and settling in. In spite of this missed opportunity we will benefit from resources developed by the UUA and made available to congregations for education, advocacy and support for taking action where possible to address injustice and protect reproductive choice against threats, especially those having to do with attempts to restrict access to family planning and abortion.

We are very fortunate here in Maine to have generally progressive legislators and organizations that are passionate about reproductive justice. One such group is **Grandmother's for Reproductive Rights, GRRJ.** GRR was founded two years ago by **Judy Kahrl of Arrowsic.** Judy and her family have lifetime involvement with Pathfinders International, a family planning organization founded by Judy's father, operating today in twenty five developing countries, delivering reproductive services. Judy was inspired to form GRR during a Pathfinder trip to Mozambique where she was impressed that grandmothers were teaching and promoting reproductive rights to younger women, most directly to their own daughters or grand daughters and thought – "Why not in Maine?".

Please join Working for Justice in the May Sarton room, **March 15**<sup>th</sup> after the worship service for an opportunity to be inspired by Judy, to hear the rest of Judy's story about GRR and learn more about Reproductive Justice and what we can do to help stop the erosion of reproductive rights.



#### SPECIAL SOCIAL JUSTICE OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH

In summer 2015, the UU College of Social Justice (UUCSJ) will offer three *Activate* trainings for high school youth. Each *Activate* program is an immersive, spiritually grounded training about social justice, grounded in UU values and practices. Participants learn in community, participate in self-reflection and worship, and join in hands-on experiences.

Activate Boston, July 18 to August 1. This two-week training for high school youth offers interactive social justice education and meaningful work with local organizations engaged in an array of local and national justice issues. Participants will learn about systems of privilege and oppression, participate in hands-on internships, and visit community partners to learn about justice issues affecting Boston today. The program will be grounded in trainings with Boston Mobilization, a UUCSJ partner, focusing on giving a foundational understanding of systems of oppression and resources for resistance and change. Youth who attended high school (grades 9–12) during the 2014-2015 school year are invited to attend.

Activate New Orleans, July 18 to July 26. This oneweek training for high school youth offers interactive social justice education and meaningful hands-on work with local organizations building a thriving New Orleans. Participants will develop skills for producing social change through community engagement, reflection on issues of to race and class, and creating the beloved community. From the wetlands to the Mardi Gras Indian bands, from jazz to bounce, from gumbo to beignets, from Plessy vs. Ferguson to the Black Panthers, New Orleans offers so much to discover — including yourself and your call to justice. Youth who attended high school during the 2014–2015 school year are invited to attend.

Activate Southwest Border, August 1 to 9 in Tucson, Arizona, is the kind of hands-on experience that will help bring the seven principles to life — and build community and connection with youth from around the country. In this intensive one-week program, participants will hear powerful testimonies from migrants, from undocumented youth who were raised in the U.S., and from the allies working to change current laws. They will walk the desert paths followed by thousands of migrants each year, and help distribute life-saving water and medicine along these routes.

#### HANNAFORD CARDS & CLYNK: How Do They Work?

#### FUNDING UUCB WITH GROCERIES, CANS & BOTTLES

Can you imagine buying groceries and helping the church at the same time? How about getting rid of some returnables and helping out UUCB at the same time? Both opportunities exist at your favorite local UU church.

#### CLYNK is the program that gains UUCB some cash for your returnables.

Green, plastic, CLYNK bags are barcoded to show who should be credited for the returnables inside. When you pick up a CLYNK bag at UUCB, your returns are credited to a cash account that ends up in UUCB's treasury. Just fill up the bag with empties and drop it off at the CLYNK chute at Hannaford supermarkets or any other CLYNK location. You are rid of some trash and UUCB gets some cash. The CLYNK bags are located on the table opposite the window where coffee is served.

## Hannaford Cards are gift cards that have cash value and can be spent at the checkout on any product Hannaford sells (including the pharmacy).

UUCB sells them in denominations of \$100, \$75, \$50 and \$25. The amount you pay is the amount you get to spend at Hannaford Supermarket. It costs you nothing, zero, zip, nada, to help the church. The church makes money when we buy the cards in bulk from Hannaford. They pay a 5% bonus for bulk purchases.

If we buy \$1,000 worth of cards, they throw in a free card worth \$50, which equals 5% of the bulk purchase. When we sell the card we put \$50 in the bank.

We are looking into selling Shaws gift cards, too. They advertise a similar bulk purchase program with the same 5% bonus. If you are a regular Shaws shopper and would like to see their gift cards for sale at UUCB, please let us know so we can gauge the interest.

Grocery card sales and the CLYNK returnables program provide some easy income for UUCB. If you eat and drink you can help.
