think it's time for another RE program update. What's been happening in those classrooms on Sunday mornings? On any given Sunday if you peek into a classroom you may see such things as dancing, stories, laughing, arts and crafts, skits, videos, games, discussion, and more, all centered around the theme of Unitarian Universalist Identity and History. As I write this article we're in the last days of winter. By the time you read this article it will be spring (yay!). That means that our RE program year will be coming to a close before we know it. Next month I'll let you know about plans for the upcoming year, but for now, below are some details on what each group has been up to this winter

PreK-Kindergarten and Grades 1-3 Classes: Our youngest children have been using curricula that are based on picture books. The PreK-K kiddos have been listening to such books as *Spoon, The Day the Crayons Quit,* and *Priscilla McDoodlenut DoodleMcMae* which explore topics such as our differences, celebrating what makes us special, and anti-bullying. The 7-8th graders went snowshoeing at Crystal Spring Farm and have enjoyed some fun board games together. The Coming of Agers have continued to flesh out their beliefs and ideas about God, death, social action, justice, and more as they work toward finishing the COA program this spring.

I'm looking forward to this spring and all of the learning and fun we'll have together as we finish up our program year.

... MINISTER'S MUSINGS ...

pril 6 is the anniversary of our first service in our new building. For many of us, the new building is the only building we associate with our congregation, for we started to attend after the building opened. For many of us, the new building is but one location we associate with our congregation, for we worshiped at the Minnie Brown Center in Bath, the Curtis Memorial Library, and even (once) the Bowdoin College Chapel while the congregation recovered from the fire and rebuilt. Of course, some of us remember the old building, the one that burned, too. Despite our many different experiences and associations, we are one congregation, joined by mission, focus, spirit, and love.

At many Passover Seders, people sing the song, "Dayenu," a word that translates roughly to "it would have been enough." The song marvels at the many blessing God has given. "Had he brought us out of Egypt, only brought us out of Egypt, never punished our tormentors, dayenu. Had he punished our tormentors, only punished our tormentors, never given us our homeland, dayenu. Had he given us our homeland, only given us our homeland, never granted us the Sabbath, dayenu." And so on, for many, many, many

verses. (I have never been at a Seder where the people sang every single verse!) The song recounts blessing after blessing.

Today I find myself wanting to recount our blessings.

Had we built a brand new building, only built a brand new building, never one of so much beauty, dayenu.

Had the building been so lovely, had it only been so lovely, never had such great acoustics, dayenu.

Had we had such great acoustics, only had such great acoustics, never filled our rooms with children, dayeu.

Had our rooms filled up with children, had they only filled with children, never grown in heart and spirit, dayenu.

Had we grown in heart and spirit, only grown in heart and spirit, never opened our doors to the community, dayenu.

(OK, if you are singing the song in your head, that last line didn't scan quite right. But the sentiment is completely right!)

And so on: We, too, could create a song of many, many verses.

Truly we have been blessed. This past year has been arduous in many ways, for sure, as we have worked out kinks, rebuilt our infrastructure to accommodate our new circumstances and responsibilities, replaced and augmented equipment to better suit our needs, continued to fulfill our financial obligations, and learned how everything worked. But we are together: spirited, vigorous, vital, laughter-filled, kind, loving, and forgiving.

Many times, people resist when they have to take a new path, even if it's a good new path. But our congregation seems to have donned hiking shoes, packed lunches and water bottles, grabbed walking sticks, and taken to the trail. Of course there will always be challenges, misunderstandings, and any number of failings to encounter as we travel. That's life. But we have proven to ourselves that we are made of strong stuff, capable of seizing joy, inspiring creativity, counting our blessings, working out problems, remembering to return to love, and keeping our eyes on the most important things. It is enough, It is more than enough. I am so grateful.

APRIL'S CHARITY WITH SOUL

TEDFORD HOUSING

UUCB has a long history of supporting Tedford Housing including participation in the Meal-a Month Program. For more information, check out their website at tefordhousing.org

Mission: Tedford Housing works together with people in their communities to find lasting solutions to the challenges of homelessness. We provide shelter, housing, and services that empower adults, children and families in need.

PROGRAMS:

EMERGENCY SHELTER

Tedford Housing provides emergency homeless shelter at two facilities in Brunswick. The adult shelter at 49 Cumberland Street houses 16 adults (both male and female). The family shelter at 34 Federal Street consists of six private apartments, each with its own bathroom and kitchen. Guests at both shelters work with a case manager at the shelter to develop an individual plan to obtain permanent housing and other services.

SUPPORTIVE HOUSISNG

The long term goal is to place people in permanent affordable housing. Many of those who are homeless have physical and/or mental health challenges and might face an overwhelming number of stresses in their lives.

Tedford manages six supported housing apartment complexes with a total of 39 units for previously homeless individuals and families. Tenants pay subsidized rent and have access to a case manager who can help them obtain services and advocate for these clients on an individualized basis. Houses are located at Everett Apartments—Brunswick, Evergreen Woods—Bath, Gilbert Place—Bath, Blake Street Family Apartments—Lewiston, Franklin Apartments—Auburn, and Pleasant Street Apartments—Augusta.

HOMELESS PREVENTION

Many people in our communities continually struggle to afford basic necessities. A costly car repair or medical bill can push a relatively stable household to the verge of homelessness. Tedford case managers work to help keep people in their homes. Case managers advocate for clients and help them with tasks such as budgeting, accessing services and decision-making.

HOMELESS YOUTH—MERRYMEETING PROJECT

Sadly, there are many school-age students who, for a variety of reasons may be homeless—an entire family could be homeless. The federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, specifies rights of these students so that they have are able to stay in school if they experience homelessness.

Tedford Housing's "Merrymeeting Project" is the program that works with three area school systems (Brunswick, Bath/RSU 1 and Topsham/RSU 75) to help homeless students. Our school liaison works with homeless students, primarily teens, to help these youth find a safe place to live, reunify with family, access resources and help teens complete schooling.

HEATING ASSISTALNCE—WARM THY NEIGHBOR

Each winter, Tedford Housing raises funds to provide one-time, emergency heating assistance to extremely low-income families and individuals in the community.

MEAL-A-MONTH PROGRAM

One of the most important volunteer opportunities at Tedford is the Meal-a-Month Program. Restaurants, organizaiatons, and individuals take turns providing a hot meal for guests at the Adult Shelter on Cumberland Street. The first Friday of every month, the UUCB provides a meal for the Tedford Shelter. Please contac Hank simpson via email at hrdsimpson@gmail.com for more details.



MUUSAN

Report on Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network meeting of March 21, 2015 submitted by Lynn Ellis

Jim Spicer and I attended the MUUSAN meeting on Saturday, March 21 as representatives from UUCB. Fifteen people were in attendance, representing 9 Maine UU churches. Spring of 2015 marks the two year mark of MUUSAN inception. Together we reviewed the focus of the commitment and goals set forth in those days of origin. We discussed the 3 major Issues of action and renewed willingness to serve on smaller focus groups. Efforts are underway to communicate with all UU churches of Maine and get their involvement going forward.

Reports from Issue Groups:

DEMOCRACY IN ACTION

(Lynn & Jim have joined this focus group)

Campaign Finance Reform: MUUSAN supports a Constitutional Amendment to permit effective campaign funding laws and a publicly funded election process. MUUSAN is an endorsing partner with Maine Citizens for Clean Elections, a nonpartisan organization committed to strengthening Maine's campaign finance laws, including especially public financing that allows moderate income persons to run for office.

Voter education and turnout: MUUSAN empowers congregations and members to participate in public discourse. We provide educational resources on how to be active in the democratic process and enable and encourage congregations to interact with their local, state, and federal legislators.

Ensuring fair election practices: MUUSAN monitors election laws and supports full restoration of the Voting Rights Act and endorses the Ranked Choice Voting efforts.

HEALTH CARE

Health care for all: MUUSAN is an active member of the Cover Maine Now Coalition of over 100 organizations working to implement the Affordable Care Act.

A Single-payer healthcare system: MUUSAN members are actively involved with the national coalition HealthCare-Now, organizing for a national single payer healthcare system. And MUUSAN continues to partner with Cover Maine Now and Maine AllCare as the impact of not accepting federal funds to expand Medicaid is starting to hurt people and institutions.

CLIMATE

Environmental Protection — we oppose the piping of tar sands oil through Maine, oppose weak rules for open pit mining, and support bills that would protect Maine lakes.

Energy Efficiency – we support federal legislation that sets emission standards for both new and existing power plants, and back state bills to reduce the cap on carbon pollution for power plants under the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) and encourage home weatherization and other efficiency methods.

Sustainable Energy Sources – we support legislation that encourages the use of solar energy in Maine.

WORKING FOR JUSTICE

BREAD FOR THE WORLD APRIL 26TH

On April 26th, you will have the opportunity to write a short letter to your Congressperson urging support for federally funded programs having to do with childhood hunger and nutrition. This will be the first year that UUCB will participate in *Bread for the World*'s "Offering of Letters," a campaign that enables churches and other groups to take collective action on key legislation to reduce hunger and poverty in the world.

You may be wondering about "Bread for the World".......

Bread for the World is an organization that effectively advocates for and influences Congress to protect and adequately fund anti-hunger programs world wide. The focus for doing so alternates each year between international food aid programs and domestic.

This year's advocacy will be on domestic programs, the theme being, Feed our Children. Priority for action this year is protecting the National School Breakfast and Lunch programs and expansion of the Summer Food Service Program. These programs provide free or reduced price meals for low income children, for some.... the only meal they might have that day. With more than 45 million Americans living below the poverty line (\$23,624 for a family of four with two children) and more than 20 percent-1 in 5-children living at risk of hunger there is particular urgency for us to urge Chellie Pingree, Bruce Poliquin, Angus King and Susan Collins to boldly use their influence to protect and improve child nutrition programs.

It's important for you to know that in their recent House and Senate Budget Committee budget proposals, both contain enormous cuts to effective anti-hunger programs! On Sunday, April 26th you can add your voice collectively with others to protest these cuts. Sylvia will preach on hunger and Alex Wheelwright, a regional Bread for the World field organizer will share the pulpit and facilitate the Offering of Letters after the worship service. April 26th may seem far away but please mark your calendar now so you won't miss this important opportunity!





BUILDING ACCESS CODE TO BE CHANGED

On Wednesday April 8 at 10:00am the current building access code will be changed to a new number. This means the current code which many of you know, will no longer work after April 8th

The code change will NOT affect the key FOB (the little black/gray disk, many of you may have.) When you swipe this in front of the key pad it will allow you access through the front door, but does NOT unlock the door permanently. The FOB temporarily unlocks the front door long enough for you to enter the building. You will need to stand by the door and let your fellow attendees in. The advantage of this type of entry, the building remains secure during after-hours activities such as behind closed door meetings and no code to remember to reset when you leave.

If you are holding an activity intended for the general public which requires the front door to be unlocked and the handicapped button activated, please contact the office after April 8, and request the new code.

From this point forward, the building code will be changed on a regular basis. Notice will be posted before the change takes place.

2015-16 PLEDGE DRIVE

The annual UUCB Pledge Drive will begin on April 12. This year, the pledge drive will be a church-wide canvass. 
