May 31. Coming of Age Service All year long our youth have been studying, volunteering, thinking, and exploring as they seek to put words to their individual theologies. This service is the capstone of the Coming of Age program: In a service the youth have designed themselves, we will hear their Credo ("I believe") statements, music, and other reflections. Come hear what they have to say and celebrate their special day. Music by Jean Lay and the Coming of Age participants.



MORE SABBATICAL NEWS

ome of you have asked for more information about my upcoming sabbatical. Planning for it is making me step out of my usual habits. I'm the kind of person who doesn't plan vacations until I am actually on vacation! But a sabbatical is different, as it requires making plans for the church while I am gone and also making my own plans to use the gift of time wisely.

These are the dates in question: October to December will be sabbatical months; January will be a month of vacation and study time. April 15 to July 15, 2016, will be sabbatical months; July 15 to August 15, 2016, will be vacation and study time.

Here, so far, is what I plan to do with the time: In October I will attend the World Parliament of Religions in Salt Lake City. Steve is going with me, and we are considering either driving or taking the train so that we can see the country a bit. In May (2016) I will attend the Festival of Homiletics in Atlanta Georgia.

Other plans are more home-based: I have some art projects I am eager to explore. I am definitely not artistic by nature, but I want to stretch myself a bit. I plan learn more about the art of pysanky (Ukranian egg dyeing) and work on some collages for which I have been saving materials forever. Also, I plan to review the history of our congregation that Minister Emeritus Brad Mitchell has completed. Last, I plan to spend some time doing some on-line study at the Worship Design Studio, a resource created by worship specialist Marcia McFee. Throughout,

of course, I plan to continue my walking program – now somewhat of an addiction for me!

I am still mulling some other ideas – chiefly a possible trip to Scotland with Steve and our son (Stocker is a Scottish name), and/or a trip south to visit our nation's Civil Rights historical locations.

In light of the sabbatical, I have taken advantage of a district program to fill the pulpit for most of the Sundays I am away during the September to June "regular church year." (Summer Sundays in 2016 are not filled yet, but I have an idea for those to discuss with the Worship Committee. More later.) District churches agree to share their ministers in sabbatical periods so that no church is left with a big gap of unfilled Sundays. Thus, over the years, both Karen Foley and I have periodically filled pulpits for other churches. (In fact, I am filling the Augusta pulpit this month, the Allen Avenue Portland pulpit in June, and the Sanford pulpit in October; Karen is filling the 1st Parish Portland pulpit next March – all to support the pulpit sharing program.) Now, as a result of our district exchange, an excellent line-up of guest ministers awaits your attention! Usually when ministers visit in this way, they bring their finest sermons with them, so you will be treated to some special preaching next year.

Ministers will not fill every Sunday. (Our district isn't that big.) Besides, sabbatical is a chance for lay people to bring their own creativity to the pulpit. Thus some Sundays will be filled by other guests from the community, parishioners in our congregation, and various committees. Before I leave, I will publish a schedule of pulpit guests.

Meanwhile, a Sabbatical Committee is hard at work, making plans for my time away next year. Members of the committee are: Mary Larson, Cindy Parker, Dan Ellis, Sharon Brown, and Wendy Roundy. We are putting systems in place to cover all the bases while I am gone. Although my time away may seem lengthy, it will pass quickly (undoubtedly for me, especially!), and with the help of the Sabbatical Committee, smoothly.

Please feel free to ask me any questions or share any concerns you have about the sabbatical. Or, for that matter, feel free to share your delights and wisdom gained from past sabbatical periods. As always, I am interested in hearing what you have to say.

On April 22, the Building and Grounds Committee deemed the snow to be melted enough to haul out some ladders and install a new metal flaming chalice sculpture on the front of our building. Crafted by Uriah Bueller, the same artist who created the flaming chalice that adorns our sanctuary, the new one features a rainbow flame to mark our commitment to welcoming and supporting the GLBTQ community. The chalice is beautiful, and it artistically pulls the front of the church together nicely. Come by and see it!

The installation was the brainchild of former Building Team member Laura Jackson, who had always envisioned a chalice in that spot. She approached the Board with her idea, and, once the idea was approved, communicated our wishes to Uriah Bueller, who made the sanctuary wall chalice. You may recall the sanctuary chalice was a gift from Richard Barrett, the grandson of the Rev. Otto Raspe, who served our congregation during the First World War. Mr. Barrett, on hearing of our interest in a second chalice, generously offered to gift us once again.

We have been so blessed by the generosity of people far and wide who have stood by us while we recovered from our fire and rebuilt our church. May we respond in kind this month when we take up a collection for the Southold NY Universalist Church who lost their building to fire in March.

MAY'S CHARITY WITH SOUL



Project of the Midcoast provides restorative conferences for adult and juvenile offenders in Knox. Waldo. Lincoln and Sagadahoc Counties and an array of restorative justice services for the Maine Coast Regional Reentry Center and for K-12 schools. The focus on offender accountability, coupled with a focus on the impact of the offense on the victim and community, has significantly decreased recidivism, healed the harm done to victims, and transformed lives with understanding and meaningful community connections.

Restorative justice is a growing movement within the educational and criminal justice systems in the US and throughout the world. It is an approach to justice that focuses on the rehabilitation of offenders through reconciliation with harmed parties (victims) and the community at large. When those that have been harmed, offenders, and community members meet to decide how to repair harm, the results can be transformational.

Those harmed take an active role in the process, while offenders are encouraged to take responsibility for their actions "to repair the harm they've done." This approach fosters dialogue between the harmed party (victim) and offender and it shows the highest rates of satisfaction and offender accountability. The process also holds the potential for those harmed and their families to have a direct voice in determining just outcomes and reestablishes the role of the community in supporting all parties affected by crime.

PREVENTION

Restorative Schools

Restorative justice in schools is a front line for preventing lives of crime. Rather than detention, suspension and expulsion — all of which thwart learning — restorative justice builds on the power of relationships, creating a cultural shift in how schools respond to misbehavior and wrong-doing. Students are provided a supportive means to take accountability for their actions, to hear from victims they've harmed, and to take steps to repair the damage they've caused. RJP offers ongoing restor-

ative intervention through school trainings in restorative justice, victim offender mediation and restorative conferencing.

INTERVENTION

Court Diversion - Restorative Community Conferencing

Judges, prosecutors, and probation officers can divert youth and young adults who have committed a crime from the traditional path of criminal justice – conviction, criminal record and in some cases incarceration – to Restorative Community Conferencing. In these circles, victims talk about the damage that was caused and the impact on their lives. The offenders tell what happened and take accountability for the harm they caused. With the help of community participants, they reach consensus on how offenders can repair the harm they have caused. When the offenders complete these agreements, usually with the help of an RJP volunteer mentor, the court typically reduces or dismisses the charges.

REINTEGRATION

Reintegrating prisoners into community

In partnership with the Maine Coastal Regional Reentry Center, the Waldo County Sheriff's Office and Volunteers of America, RJP applies the principles and practices of restorative justice to build trust and relationships among men and staff in the Center and in the community of Belfast and surrounding area. At any given time, up to 32 resident men complete a rigorous application and selection process to finish the final eight to twelve months of their sentences at the Center. We match these residents with mentors from the community, teach them restorative justice and facilitate circles to address issues and resolve conflict.

WORKING FOR JUSTICE

AN UPDATE ON RESTORATIVE JUSTICE IN BRUNSWICK AND AN INVITATION TO JOIN AN EXPLORATORY CIRCLE

Last spring a collaborative group from Bowdoin College, First Parish, St. Paul's and UU Church of Brunswick organized a community forum based on Michelle Alexander's book, Mass Incarceration in an Age of Colorblindness. That group went on to explore the possibility of introducing restorative justice values and practices to the Brunswick community. With guidance and facilitation from Restorative Justice Institute of Maine (RJIM), members of the collaborative read Howard Zehr's The Little Book of Restorative Justice, and many participated in a series of five Exploratory Circles to learn more about the concepts and principles of restorative practices. Circle participants experienced the potential power of those practices in personal relationship and community and are now prepared to facilitate Exploratory Circles themselves.

By "training trainers", RJIM is able to strengthen its capacity (and mission) to expand restorative practices in Maine. At the same time that this second series of Exploratory Circles is being offered to individuals, RJIM is reaching out at a systems wide level to several Maine communities, including Brunswick. Within months RJIM hopes to initiate a wider community

conversation to establish restorative practices *services* in Brunswick with potential roles and appropriate training for those interested.

We are all encouraged to read Howard Zehr's short but very informative book and to consider participating in an Exploratory Circle. When individuals within a community develop a thorough understanding of restorative values and practices, the culture of that community begins to shift, making attempts at community wide action more effective.

Copies of *The Little Book of Restorative Justice* are available for \$5.00 at the UUCB and St. Paul's church offices, and two series of Exploratory Circles are being scheduled for three 2 hour sessions each:

Wednesdays, 3-5pm (6/10, 6/17, 6/24) or Saturdays, 9:30-11:30am (6/13, 6/20, 6/27).

If we all give a hand, we'll build a greener land, It's up to you and you UU's.



- Anticipate issues/changes that impact ongoing functioning of committee
- Express appreciation when/where appropriate.
