



The affiliate name, **7 Rivers Maine**, is a derivation of seven of our service area's rivers: Cathance, Androscoggin, Kennebec, Sheepscot, Damariscotta, New Meadows, and Medomak. SUMMER UPDATE

Adapted from the MUUSAN July newsletter and submitted by Lynn Ellis

At the July 11th MUUSAN meeting the three Focus areas reviewed commitments and made recommendations for ongoing action.

Climate Action:

A letter signed by MUUSAN members was sent to President Obama with concerns about the Trans-Pacific Partnership and its potential adverse impact on the environment. Climate Action Chair, Melanie Lanctot summarized the status of environment-related bills that were before the legislature. Developing a solar policy for Maine remains a priority that MUUSAN will continue to track. Dale McCormick is now part of a newly formed Maine group, the Climate Table. MUUSAN is the first faith group to be involved.

Restoring/Strengthening Democracy:

Our Fifth Principle calls on UUs to affirm and promote the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. To strengthen the democratic process, MUUSAN supports the Maine Citizens for Clean Elections and Ranked Choice Voting. The Clean Election Initiative will be on the ballot this November and Ranked Choice Voting Initiative has gathered the necessary signatures to appear on the 2016 ballot.

Healthcare:

Maine All-Care has presented a well received program at a number of congregations to promote single-payer healthcare. This year marks the 50th anniversary of Medicare. Mary Ann Larson, representing MUUSAN, will participate in a rally on the 30th of July to make a statement in support from the faith-based perspective.

Other News:

Mary Ann Larson and Lynn Ellis will be representing MUUSAN at the <u>Brunswick Peace Fair</u> on <u>August 1st</u>. Trudy Ferland and Lynn Ellis will lead the worship service at UUCB on <u>January 10</u>, <u>2016</u> and talk about MUUSAN.



The next MUUSAN meeting, focusing on Restoring Democracy, will be held on September 12th at the Augusta UU Church.

Apology to Betty Wurtz. In last month's newsletter, I mentioned that Betty Wurtz, had just celebrated her 80th birthday the week before she marched the entire parade route of the Gay Pride Parade. What made the feat much more amazing is that she had just celebrated her **90th birthday**, not her 80th!

TIME TO SIGN UP FOR CHALICE CIRCLES!

Chalice Circles are small groups that meet monthly for respectful listening and sharing on deep and meaningful topics—a wonderful way to get to know others in a deeper way than most social occasions allow. People often tell me that once they've been in such a group, when they come to church events they see people they now know and feel connected with them.

To quote Sylvia: "The groups help us to embrace our Mission Statement. Each meeting has a *spiritual* component. The groups *welcome all* who are interested; at the end of a year, the groups re-form to open the door for more newcomers to join them. Group members *nurture one another* during the year by creating an environment where deep listening can occur. And groups provide service to both church and wider community to help us engage in our commitment to *work for justice* and to *care for the earth:*" each group performs two service projects, one for UUCB and one for the greater community.

In Chalice Circles we covenant to listen in silence and wait until a speaker is done speaking to begin speaking (some form of announcing our intention to speak is used, perhaps a gesture or a "talking stick"). Silence, when it occurs, is enriching and beneficial, allowing us to fully take in what the other says. This is very counter-cultural!

We covenant not to engage in cross-talk (direct response by one person to another), but to simply hold in respect and care what the other has said. When we speak we don't address our remarks to individuals but "speak into the circle." We may agree or disagree with the speaker, but we speak from our own perspective and our own experience rather than critique or argue a point of view. We do not offer advice unless it is asked for. All of this is counter-cultural too!

As you may be picking up here, Chalice Circles are not "discussions" or times to share our knowledge, not even a "conversation" in the usual way of conversation in our culture. They are an opportunity for intentional, deep sharing from our own perspectives and experiences, an opportunity to hear others in a way we don't usually get to—and to *be heard* in a way we don't usually get to be heard! It can be transformative to be heard with genuine respect and care.

The 2015-16 Chalice Circle season begins with sign-ups now until September 20. Circles will meet October through June. Chalice Circles are being offered at specific days and times when facilitators are available to lead them. FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

s the new chair of the Trustees, and as a fairly new member of UUCB, I want to introduce myself to those who might not know who I am. I have also met many of you, but perhaps some don't know my background. I also want to welcome people to call, email or meet with me if you have concerns I should bring to the Board's attention.

I moved to Brunswick three years ago to live near family and my beloved ocean after having lived in Meadville, PA for about 40 years. Born and raised in Bristol, CT, I attended Allegheny College and remained in Meadville where I raised my two children and pursued my career. I am a PA Licensed Counselor where I spent the bulk of my working years as the Education Guidance Counselor in the Adult Education Department of a PA state prison for men. There were 2,300 inmates in the prison, and my job was to counsel them to obtain a GED and to get vocational training offered at the prison. Five full time academic teachers and seven vocational teachers helped many gain skills necessary to succeed upon their release. Both rewarding and frustrating, I am passionate about quality education for people of all ages. I also have done private counseling in part time positions.

I have previous board experience which I hope will help in this position. I served two terms on the board of the UU Church of Meadville, where I was a member for 18 years. I also was President of the school board for four years of the private school my children attended, and President for three years of the board of the Meadville Community Theatre.

At UUCB, I sing in the choir, serve on the Pastoral Care Associates team, have attended Chalice Circles for three years, attended Working For Justice meetings, completed the Restorative Justice training, and have been a member of the board for the past year. Outside of church, I sing with the Brunswick Oratorio Chorale.

Our church, UUCB, is a more active, exciting place to be than any of my past experiences. I've been so impressed with the positive energy and cooperative atmosphere all of you provide. Cindy Parker (and others in the past before I moved here) was such a gift to our board and is a very tough act to follow. We are so fortunate for all she has given the church. She meets with me, answers many questions regularly and has promised to mentor me along the way. It is my goal to do my best to keep the momentum going, involving as many of you as will help us keep this such a happy, productive and meaningful church. In this coming year, with Sylvia's sabbatical for much of it, I will be counting on all of us to maintain all of our activities.
