RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

With the month of November comes the beginning of the winter holiday season- Thanksgiving, Hannukah, Christmas, and the New Year being among the most frequently celebrated winter holidays on our part of the planet. These holidays are closely tied to food, especially Thanksgiving. Coming from a situation in which I have plenty of access to food, it is easy for me to anticipate these holidays with excitement. Stuffing, buttercup squash, and cranberry sauce are on my mind starting in mid-October. I am fortunate enough, at least at the moment, not to have to worry about whether or not I will be able to have these items at my Thanksgiving meal, much less worry about whether or not I'll have any items for any sort of meal at all. It's easy to take that for granted though. Walking through the supermarket, aisle after aisle stuffed with every possible food item one can imagine, it is hard to believe that there are people in our midst who go without. Once upon a time I worked for the Salvation Army. Although my official title was 'Youth Pastor', I was really a jack of all trades- leading worship music, fundraising, planning children's programs, staffing the food pantry when no else was available, and picking up donated food items, among other things. The amount of expired (but still perfectly edible) food I picked up was just astounding at times. Loaves of bread, buckets of soup, pastries, and other items that were about to be thrown out that I picked up and brought to be used for the soup kitchen program and youth programs.

According to Good Shepherd Food Bank of Maine, 16.2% of households in our state are food insecure. This means that about 208,000 individuals in Maine lack access to enough food to ensure adequate nutrition. Maine ranks 12th in the nation and 1st in New England for food insecurity. Not exactly a statistic to be proud of. Based on the quantity of food in our state and the amount of food waste that is produced because of expired and unused food, the problem isn't one of quantity, but rather access. So what can be done? Well, first of all, though it isn't a remedy to the problem, those of us lucky enough to be experiencing food security can donate food to food banks that serve our communities. In fact, we will be holding a food drive for Midcoast Hunger Prevention Program as part of the Thanksgiving Inter-generational service this month. Be sure to bring along some food to share with your neighbors. Secondly, we need to address access issues. You might be interested to know that 35% of those households that are food insecure make too much to qualify for food stamps. By advocating for such things as a higher minimum wage, we might be able to make it so that some of those folks working full time jobs have the money they need to feed their families. I encourage you to do some research and find out what you can do to help address hunger in our state. Write some letters, participate in a demonstration, donate food...do something to make a difference this holiday season.

NOVEMBER CHARITY WITH SOUL

Immigrant Legal Advocacy Project (ILAP)

started as a pro bono effort in 1993 and incorporated as a nonprofit in 2000. Since that time it has grown from a 2-attorney operation to a thriving statewide organization with a dedicated 9-person staff, 130 pro bono attorneys who worked tirelessly for our clients and 60 other volunteers who are trained to work with our clients.

In 2014, these are the numbers that represent human lives changed forever by immigration legal aid provided by our organization:

- ILAP clients originated from 16 counties in Maine
- 2,721 Mainers received direct help from ILAP
- ILAP's *Immigration Clinic* served 1,805 individuals
- 1,578 people attended education and outreach events
- ILAP staff and *pro bono* attorneys provided full legal representation to 457 individuals

Here is the story of one of ILAP's former clients, Tabin Tangila mesu Kamba, from the Democratic Republic of Congo:

While living in the Democratic Republic of Congo with his family, Tabin worked as a human rights activist and educator. In 2011, the presidential elec-

tion generated a great deal of chaos and violence, which caused Tabin to fear for his safety. He knew that if he remained in his native country, the lives of those closest to him, including his pregnant wife and three young children, would be in danger. Tabin made the difficult decision to leave everything he knew behind him and seek refuge in the United States.

A few months after arriving in Maine, Tabin learned about ILAP's services and spoke with a lawyer here. In December, Tabin received word that a lawyer from ILAP's *pro bono* panel would help him with his case. Although it would be a lengthy process, Tabin knew that he had finally found a pathway to stability – personally, financially, and socially. Tabin worked with his lawyer for seven months before he was fully prepared for his scheduled asylum interview in August. After a grueling waiting period, and nearly four months after his interview, Tabin received word that he had been granted asylum. He was overwhelmed with emotion when his lawyer told him the news.

He has enrolled in several classes and he works tirelessly to improve his English language skills. Today he works at a local nonprofit, serving Portland's community members, which he loves.

The next meeting of Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network will be on **Saturday, November 14 at the Augusta UU from 10am-12pm.**

Here is a bit of history on how state advocacy networks began.

In the work of the Coalition of Unitarian Universalist State Action Networks (CUUSAN) and the State Networks, we acknowledge the importance and value of religious voice in the public debate. The U.S.A. stands proud of its commitment to the separation of church and state. However, separation does not mean silence. And churches have rarely been silent during the history of this country. Religious groups have been at the forefront of many of the major political debates of this country. For UUs, the natural voice of religious leaders combined with our own Principles requires us to be an active voice in the public arena. This is reflected in our history of leadership in many of these debates including the abolition of slavery, work for suffrage rights and civil rights and most recently in the work for marriage equality.

State Networks focus on increasing the power of our voice and making those voices an effective tool for change. The voice of a single church can be very strong, but the building of a network around the state enables us to strengthen the voice of our individual churches and expand our reach, build on-going relationships with legislative leaders, and develop political skills needed to enact the changes we are seeking. But even more importantly, State Networks give visibility to Unitarian Universalists. Through the small acts of many we have the opportunity to become a respected voice in our State Houses for the oppressed, the needy and the poor.

MAINE MOMS DEMAND ACTION

Maine Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense is a coalition of Maine moms, survivors of gun violence, law enforcement, faith leaders, domestic violence prevention advocates, and other concerned Mainers that mobilizes to reduce gun violence, improve public safety, and protect our communities.

Currently in Maine, criminal background checks are only required for gun sales at licensed dealers. That means that felons, domestic abusers, and other dangerous people can easily buy guns anonymously from unlicensed sellers—including at gun shows and from strangers they meet online or through classified ads—with no background check required, no questions asked.

The Maine Background Check Initiative would close this loophole in Maine by requiring a criminal background check for **every** gun sale in the state, with reasonable exceptions for family, hunting, and self-defense.

Debbie Atwood is the Regional Field Organizer for Maine Moms Demand Action for the greater Portland area. A long-time community organizer in Maine and a former Vice Chair of the Brunswick Town Council, Debbie has worked on issues including peace and justice, climate change, and conservation. Debbie was Chair of the Social Action Committee at Allen Avenue UU Church in 2003 and 2004.

END INEQUALITY LEADERSHIP TEAM

Since its inception in March of this year, the End Inequality Leadership Team has been actively working on its mission to guide a compassionate, respectful process with the congregation to create a focused approach to ending inequality. Our first major task was to gather information in order to determine which inequality issues were the most concerning to our members and friends. The following six categories were mentioned most often in response to our survey: Income; Food/clothing/shelter; Education; Health Care; Gender; and Judicial. These priorities will be reflected in the formation of Focus Groups, which will study the issues and make recommendations to the congregation in the spring of 2016. See below for more information about the Focus Groups.

The topic of inequality has been receiving a great deal of media attention recently. Increased awareness is a necessary first step toward progress, and another ongoing task for the Team is our process of learning and sharing information. We have established a section of the church library devoted to books on the subject of inequality, and the church website now includes *Our Vision: Ending Inequality* under Church Activities. Information on the site is organized in several categories: UUA Resources; Causes of Inequality; Homelessness; Public Opinion Polls; Multiple Issues; Income Inequality. Members of the congregation have been helpful in gathering this information, and we encourage communication with the Team via our email address: end.inequality123@gmail.com.

Part of our effort to shepherd the work of the End Inequality initiative in a coordinated way includes staying in contact with other groups in the church. We met initially with the Nominating Committee and Reverend

Stocker to discuss our charge and expectations for the Team. We have since met with representatives of the Long Range Planning, Religious Education, Budget, Working for Justice, Adult Education, and Worship Committees. A representative from our Team attends each Church Council meeting. Another of our goals is to connect with groups outside of UUCB, and we expect that to be one outcome of the Focus Group project. Two people from the congregation have committed to creating a data base of programs already underway within and outside of UUCB.

Many people attended the worship service led by our Team on October 4. Responses from those present were very positive, and we were pleased to have an opportunity for sharing in this way. The goal of ending inequality is, of course, a challenge of major proportions. It may be helpful to keep in mind the quotation from T.H. White in *The Once and Future King* that was shared at the end of the sermon:

"The best thing for being sad," replied Merlin, "is to learn something. That's the only thing that never fails. You may grow old and tremble in your anatomies, you may lie awake at night listening to the disorder of your veins, you may miss your only love, you may see the world about you devastated by evil lunatics, or know your honour trampled in the sinews of baser minds. There is only one thing which the mind can never exhaust, never alienate, never be tortured by, never fear or distrust and never dream of regretting. Learning is the thing for you."

Focus groups will likely be made up of 4 to 8 members who choose a topic they wish to learn more about. Each group will decide on meeting times and locations, as they are meant to be self-sustaining. We hope each group will commit to studying their focus issue by reading articles, a book, and/or doing online research focusing on each issue and on various solutions that the church might work towards. The process of study and action ideally will be cyclical, with study informing action and *vice versa*. Results of this work will be shared with the congregation in the spring.

Each group will have a facilitator who will go through facilitator training on November 7. It will be the facilitator's role to create open discussion, inclusion and a positive learning experience for all focus group members.

It has been a good Summer for the UUCB solar Power.

This summer, we have generated a little more than 11000 Kwatthrs and of that amount we have banked about 3400 Kwatthrs with CMP to be used this coming winter.

Our best solar day was May 23 when we produced 101 Kwatthrs.

The total amount of power generated by our system from the installation at the end of February of last year is about 29300 Kwatthrs.

That is a value of more than \$ 3000.
