## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The RE program has just finished the first unit for this year- community. We explored why we come to church and what it means to be part of a community through activities such as books, stories, crafts, games, interviews with long-time members of our church, and the 4-6<sup>th</sup> class even did a survey of beliefs with the congregation which you may have participated in. One interesting aspect of our congregation, and UU congregations in general, is the diversity of beliefs within our community. I am intrigued by the interplay of unity and diversity in Unitarian Universalism. How is it that we can hold so many theological beliefs but still desire to come together as a community? I find that when I am speaking to people who are unfamiliar with Unitarian Universalism, this can be a cause of confusion. I am often asked why we bother to gather together or how we worship. At first, I was unsure

how to answer these questions but as I thought about it I began to see the beauty in the interplay of unity and diversity. We choose to unite in our diversity of beliefs because we have unity in believing that each person has a right to find his or her own spiritual path. When we are acting as our best selves, we are unified in working toward the greater ideals that we share in common- such as justice and growth and civil liberties- and those concepts transcend individual theological beliefs.

That said, I love finding out what people believe and to learn from their perspectives. The 4-6<sup>th</sup> graders had fun learning about the beliefs of our congregation through the survey they conducted. They were introduced to some theological terms such as pantheism, humanism, atheism, paganism, agnosticism, and theism. In the survey, people were asked to select the statements that best reflected their current personal beliefs about God. These statements were associated with the theological terms. Take a look at the graphic (created by the 4-6<sup>th</sup> grade RE class) accompanying this article to see the top beliefs held by our church community. Oh, and if those theological terms sound unfamiliar to you- broaden your theological knowledge and take a moment to look them up. Interesting stuff!



## WORKING FOR JUSTICE

### MUUSAN

The Maine Unitarian Universalist State Advocacy Network met on November 14 for their bi-monthly meeting at the UU Community Church of Augusta. Lynn Ellis attended on behalf of UUCB.

#### ADMINISTRATOR HIRED:

Trudy announced that Betsy Parsons has been hired as our 12 hour/week administrator. Betsy is a member of the Allen Ave. congregation and is an experienced social justice activist in Maine. Five candidates were considered.

#### BECOMING A 501c3:

While the Augusta church has generously served as our fiduciary agent until now, David reported, as per a fundraising workshop he and Cush Anthony attended earlier this fall, that MUUSAN will need to begin the process for achieving 501c3 status in order to facilitate fundraising efforts and to ensure the long term viability of the organization.

#### LEGISLATIVE GRID:

Stephanie has created a legislative grid, patterned after one created by the Maine chapter of NASW – National Association of Social Workers, that will enable us to track bills that concern our issue groups as they move through the legislative process. This will include dates of hearings and work sessions, MUUSAN's position and final action.

#### ISSUE GROUP REPORTS:

**Democracy:** Clean Elections ballot measure passed!!! Many MUUSAN members participated in collecting signatures for this initiative. Signatures have been submitted to the Sec. of State for the Rank-Choice/Instant Run-off ballot initiative to be on the 2016 statewide ballot. MUUSAN members have been involved in this effort as well.

**Healthcare:** There's a petition effort underway in Colorado to create a single-payer system in that state. *Maine All Care* leaders state that a 4-year educating effort will be necessary to create the support for single-payer in Maine.

**Climate Change:** Melanie has been involved in the stakeholder meetings conducted by the PUC designed to develop a solar policy for Maine. She also attended a Natural Resources Council of Maine meeting and conference call to rally support for solar energy. Kitsy moderated an inter-faith discussion on the Papal encyclical on climate change at Bowdoin in October. She also facilitated a discussion of the DVD, *The Wisdom to Survive* at the Kennebunk UU, in conjunction with the Sierra Club chapter in that area. Jane, Isabel and Mary Ann attended a climate advocacy training presented by the Portland Fiends, the Friends Committee on National Legislation and the Citizen Climate Lobby. Mary Ann encouraged people to call and email Senator Collins as her support in the Senate is key and Maine has compelling reasons to be concerned about climate change.

#### EXPANDING OUR EMAIL LIST:

This has been an on-going discussion. How do we reach all those who might like to be involved in our advocacy work long-term and increase our number of members receiving the newsletter and 'like us' on facebook. The recommendation was made to send information to congregational administrators and let them filter the message through their system.....place in the bulletin, forward to the social justice group etc.



## CRISIS AT UNITARIAN CHURCH OF BURUNDI

The Unitarian Church of Burundi is in the midst of crisis, under attack from their government for reasons of religious identity. The church has been attacked, ransacked and robbed. Church members have been jailed, threatened, and forced to flee for safety.

The Rev. Fulgence Ndagijimana has been in police custody in the capital Bujumbura since at least Wednesday, November 18, and his supporters are concerned about his physical safety as the political and human rights situations in Burundi continue to deteriorate.

The celebration of the winter solstice was one of the most important in the calendar of the ancient people of the British Isles and Ireland. ## END INEQUALITY LEADERSHIP TEAM

We have entered the next phase of our project to form groups focused on studying the aspects of inequality of most concern to the congregation. Group facilitator training was completed on December 7<sup>th</sup>. Led by Carol Evans, eleven members of the congregation who have made a commitment to co-facilitate study groups participated in the workshop. Each of the facilitators chose to be responsible for one of the following categories:

- 1) Income
- 2) Shelter/Food/Clothing
- 3) Education
- 4) Medical Care
- 5) Judicial



Signup sheets have been made available in church, and 23 people have signed up to participate thus far. It is expected that each group will meet at least once before Christmas. Groups will continue to be open for new members, but we encourage those interested to join at this time. Signup sheets will be available after church, and requests may be sent to [end.inequality123@gmail.com](mailto:end.inequality123@gmail.com).

Another of our goals is to develop and maintain connections with other efforts to end inequality in the church and in the community. On November 2<sup>nd</sup>, three

members of our Team attended a breakfast meeting hosted by Goodwill Northern New England. Goodwill is an international organization whose mission is to “enhance the dignity and quality of life of individuals and families by strengthening communities, eliminating barriers to opportunity, and helping people in need reach their full potential through learning and the power of work.” We learned that Goodwill provides an amazing variety of services in northern New England, and we will include information about them in the inventory of existing programs currently being developed by Heather Osterfield and Judy Chambers.

Other events focusing on ending inequality include:

- 1) a “community read” sponsored by our Adult Education group
- 2) a film presentation and discussion about the challenges faced by Wabanaki people, sponsored by the Working For Justice group
- 3) a film and discussion focused on addressing the problem of increasing costs of health care
- 4) a church-wide forum scheduled for Saturday, May 21<sup>st</sup> which will bring together the End Inequality study groups and people working on other related church initiatives to review progress and plan for the future.

### NEWCOMER'S CHAT




