This does not require prior preparation and is a good fit for people who can commit to volunteering about 8 Sunday during the program year but are too busy during the week to prepare activities. Workshop leaders are adults from the congregation who would enjoy sharing their love of painting, cooking, music, writing, drawing, sculpture, sewing, knitting, gardening, poetry, movement/dance, fitness, video, theater/drama, service, building, magic, martial arts, science, nature, origami, quilting, pottery, animals, woodworking... As you can see, there are practically endless possibilities! Workshop leaders prepare and lead a workshop that spans 1-2 Sundays during the program year. If you are interested in leading a workshop I can help you figure out the details and a connection to the monthly topic and the overall theme. Please contact me if you are interested in volunteering.

MINISTER'S MUSINGS

At our June 11 annual meeting, the congregation passed this motion: "That the congregation endorse and support the Black Lives Matter movement and honor UUA's request for UU churches to become visually and audibly involved in the related issues. Our involvement will include studying the issues and displaying a Black Lives Matter banner on the church."

Five days later, St. Paul Police Officer Jeronimo Yanez was acquitted for killing Philando Castille. On June 21, Milwaukee Police Officer Dominique Heaggan-Brown was acquitted for killing Sylville Smith. Both Castille and Smith were black men. Castille was killed at a traffic stop after notifying Officer Yanez that he had a gun. Smith was killed by Officer Heaggan-Brown after throwing the gun he was carrying over a fence. In Castille's case, he was trying to disclose information for his own safety. In Smith's case, he was technically unarmed.

I cannot fully imagine what it is to be a police officer. Here in Brunswick, I have witnessed officers respond with great care and compassion, especially to addicts they find passed out around town (including in the back doorway of our church). Rather than arrest addicts, the police try to connect them with resources so that they can help themselves. I have also been the direct recipient of police compassion, at both the scene of our church fire and the March 2011 break-in to our church.

What must it be like to put your life on the line, especially in America's gun-crazy culture? Every traffic stop, every rally, every encounter, even every visitor to the police station could bring violence. You have to be ready, or else.

At the same time, our entire culture is steeped in white supremacy. Our courts are. Our police are. All of us are, even if we are people of color ourselves. Our culture teaches, whether implicitly or explicitly, that people of color are dangerous. And so a police officer will reach for his or her gun when having the kinds of encounters Officers Yanez and Heaggan-Brown had with their victims.

Here's the thing, though: At the end of the shift, police officers can put down their weaponry. If they aren't marginalized in any obvious way (if they aren't people of color, for instance), they can blend into the rest of society, being no more in danger than I am.

But a person of color can never put down their color. A person of color is at risk all the time, just because of the way they look. Statistics show that over and over again.

I know it was a hard process for our church to decide to pass the motion to endorse the Black Lives Matter movement. We had moments of awkwardness, messiness, and genuine pain. There may be more such moments to come, because the work we have chosen to take up is far from easy.

I also know that exploring issues of racism is a challenge in Maine, because – if we are white – we just don't witness or hear those issues all that often. We may even have very limited relationships with people of color. We have to go out of our way to find accounts that will give us windows into the lives of those at the margins.

Even so (maybe especially so), it's important for us to conduct a deeper study of what some at the May 31 discussion group called "America's original sin." When we gain a better understanding of ourselves and others, everyone benefits. Turning our culture around will require everyone's energy and commitment.

That's why I am so grateful for our congregation's bravery and commitment, our willingness to step out of our

comfort zone a little bit so that we can endorse the Black Lives Matter movement and work on related issues. In our little corner of the universe, we do our work to help birth a fairer, more equitable America. That kind of work is holy work. And, holy work is what the church is here to do.




TIME AWAY DURING THE SUMMER

Since 1998, our programs have helped boys reach their potential to become emotionally healthy, respectful, non-violent men. We work directly with boys, girls, men and women who stand up together as allies in support of gender equality and against gender based violence.

Programs & Services:

Reducing Sexism and Violence Program (RSVP): This program raises awareness of social pressures connected to sexism, violence, and other harmful behaviors. Our unique set of RSVP curriculums are used to lead intensive workshops with boys in middle schools, all genders together in high schools, and adults in a variety of settings. Participants are trained to safely intervene to prevent potentially harmful situations from becoming violent.

Community Programming: We hold events and workshops for parents, educators, and professionals with a focus on the healthy, non-violent development of boys and bringing boys and girls together as allies. Through film screenings, lectures and panel discussions, we open community conversations and invite adults into this work to support the youth in their lives.

Boot Camp for New Dads: This program encourages and inspires new fathers to share equally in the caregiving of their children. Men, women, and entire families benefit as gender specific barriers are challenged and generational cycles of negative behaviors are broken.





BOARD REPORT

FROM OUT-GOING BOARD CHAIR, MARY LARSON



Maine! It seemed to take a long time this year. I hope your gardens are growing, flowers starting to bloom, visitors coming, and happy times are ahead for you.

For those of you who were not in attendance at the Annual Meeting, I'd like to give a brief summary of our actions. We were able to pass a budget of approximately \$294,000 which now brings all of our wonderful staff to better than the UUA mid-point. We elected Charlie Evans to a second term on the board as well as Wendy Roundy and Paul Peranteau for their first term. They replace Linda Mallard and

Tom Rumpf, who have now completed their terms. Our new officers for next year are Charlie Evans (Chair), Glenn Williams (Vice Chair), Paul Peranteau (Treasurer) and Mary Larson (Clerk). We also elected Mike Heath for his third term as Moderator, and our Nominating Committee members, Maryli Tiemann, Brad Mitchell, and Sally Horne for another term.

The Working For Justice Committee presented our Charities for Soul designees for the coming year, which were approved. We agreed to sign the UUA recommended Declaration of Conscience as a congregation. We also voted to support the Black Lives Matter national movement, and as the UUA has recommended, study issues of white supremacy in our culture. We will purchase and display a Black Lives Matter banner on our church. The Working for Justice and Membership committees will be completing that task in the near future.

And finally, we accepted a plan for the proceeds from the sale of the Gurnet Road property by placing \$75,000 in a contingency fund for long-range building needs. The remaining \$22,500 will be used for immediate building needs, to be determined by the congregation in the fall. There will be meetings to discuss projects needed, estimates obtained ending with a final vote to be taken by the congregation.

I want to thank you for the privilege of serving as your board chair for the past two years. I was new to UUCB when I was elected, so your trust was important to me. I had been on the board of my PA UU church several times, though, and was very familiar with UUism! The board you have elected is strong, with knowledgeable, hard workers as members. Charlie Evans and I have worked together these past few months, and I have great confidence in him. Our church in Brunswick is amazing to me. It is my dream church, and how I think a UU church should be. I have many hopes for the coming years.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY CODERED COMMUNITY NOTIFICATION

Cumberland County has asked churches to make the following information available to their members. Cumberland County has contracted with Emergency Communications Network, Inc for its "CodeRED" high speed telephone emergency notification service. In the event of a natural disaster or manmade emergency, the CodeRED system gives cities and counties the ability to deliver pre-recorded emergency telephone notifications/information messages to targeted areas or the entire region. Such emergencies would include, but not be limited to: evacuation notices, bioterrorism alerts, boil water notices, and missing child reports.

CodeRED sends emergency notifications via hardwired phone, cell phone, text message, or email. CodeRED has provided the County with a database of residential and business phone numbers derived from public sources such as phonebooks, however no resident should assume their information is in the system. BOARD REPORT

FROM INCOMING BOARD CHAIR, CHARLIE EVANS



s I begin my term as the incoming chair of the Board of Trustees, I feel it would be useful for you all to know a little about myself in the hope that it might make you feel more comfortable in approaching me with any interests or concerns that you may have.

My wife Carol and I first attended a Unitarian Universalist Church of Brunswick service in the middle of May 2014. It was one of the first services held in the new church building. Members of each of the church committees had been asked to write a poem and create a banner portraying their committee and after the parade Reverend Stocker did a short interview with each group.

We were instantly inspired. Such commitment, meaning and yes, joy was evident among the congregation. And, in such a glorious space with this wonderful minister directing it all. We felt like "This is home, and we want this in our lives". We made the leap and moved to Topsham in July of 2014 and became members a few months later.

- 1. This will involve cooperation between all of our committees to strengthen our faith principles and beliefs and define a clear and engaging sense of mission and vision for the congregation as well as leading, educating and nurturing the building of the church's reserves, investments, bequests/trusts and the overseeing the ongoing annual budget pledge drive.
- 2. The Board has already initiated the process of establishing a ministerial committee to provide Sylvia with a group of parishioners to provide her with advice and perspective should she ask for or need them. I would like to see this committee formed by this fall.
- 3. I would like to see the process for allotting the Gurnet Road funds of \$22,500 for improvements to the building, which were approved at the Annual Meeting, decided upon and the improvements finished by the end of June 2018.

I want to thank Mary Larson for her fine leadership and care over the past two years, especially her willingness to serve as chair for a second year in order to lead the church during Sylvia's sabbatical. She has performed a remarkable service to our congregation and she has been generous enough to include me in the process of leadership over the past few months.
