Monday is the Sabbath for church staff.



# MINISTER'S MUSINGS

oet Karin Boye writes, "it hurts when buds burst. Otherwise why would spring hesitate?" This spring certainly has hesitated. Lingering cold and damp have inspired impatient irritation in many. I see people greet the scattered beautiful days with a ravenous hungering. But, despite Spring's hesitation, at some point we will have slid into it. In fact, we may be there already. One day, a few green shoots were peeking out of my garden. Now, suddenly, I have lots of lush greenery and some brightly colored flowers. Once the plants decided it was spring, they sprang.

So often life seems like that: a steady yearning, a hovering around some barrier or goal or benchmark, and then, all of a sudden, we're across and looking back. It feels almost as though we are required to spend time at some borders before we cross over. And then suddenly that border is behind us.

Claire started her internship with us in September 2016. Then two years felt like a long time. Now, all of a sudden, two years is up.

UUCB's membership hovered around 200 for several years. We'd just about get there, and someone would move or die. Roughly a year ago, we finally welcomed our 200<sup>th</sup> member. Now, all of a sudden, we have around 220.

One might linger close to death for a long time before suddenly embarking on that final journey.

Sometimes those border places can be visceral or visual ... working yourself beyond some physical limitation such as the number of miles you can walk or run or the number of laps you can swim. Or the border areas might be more internalized limitations ... those things we tell ourselves we can't do: "I can't do math!" "I can't greet strangers unless they greet me first!" But maybe with a little perseverance we can eventually sail past some limitations.

That doesn't mean we can do everything. Some limits are essential and some are unmovable. That's okay. The trick is to discern when we are at a true limitation and when we are at a border we might, with pluck and determination, be able to cross. There's no point in my trying to be an NBA player, for instance. I'll just have to find exercise, income, and fun in other places.

Best guess? I will never be fluent in French, but I can improve. By studying it a little bit for the last couple of years, I have certainly gained knowledge, vocabulary, and confidence about trying to speak it, even in my non-proficient way. Sometimes church can be a safe place to test some of one's perceived limitations. Wish you could sing, but convinced you aren't a singer? Try singing hymns: You can let the chorus of voices carry you as you raise your voice. Wish you felt more confident about public speaking? Try doing the chalice lighting for a Sunday service. Always wondered if you would make a good teacher? Volunteer to support Sunday School teachers sometime. Wish you could make an impact in earth care or social justice but afraid to strike out on your own? The Green Sanctuary Committee and Working for Justice Steering groups would be happy to fold you into their activities. Wish you knew more about gardening? Volunteer to help our gardeners.

Opportunity abounds at UUCB. Try things, and, with time, you may find yourself sailing across some border you had once perceived as impenetrable.

## JUNE CHARITY WITH SOUL TEDFORD HOUSING



Mission: Tedford Housing works together with people in their communities to find lasting solutions to the challenges of home-lessness. We provide shelter, housing, and services that empower adults, children and families in need.

Tedford Housing believes that everyone deserves to have a safe and affordable home. Over the years, the organization has evolved from providing emergency shelter to adults to offering shelter, supported housing and homeless prevention services for adults, families and teens. On any given day, Tedford Housing is working with 120 people who do not have a permanent or stable home. With the help of our many supporters, we serve over 800 people each year.

#### Housing

- Tedford Housing maintains two emergency shelters for adults and families in Brunswick, Maine.
- Tedford Housing also manages 6 apartments with affordable rents and case management services to qualified, previously homeless individuals and families.

- **Homeless Prevention**
- Tedford Housing's homeless prevention case manager works to provide case management to families experiencing a housing crisis. We partner with community agencies to provide security deposits and rental assistance to prevent evictions and/or secure alternative housing.

#### **Merrymeeting Project for Homeless Youth**

• Tedford Housing's school liaison for the Merrymeeting Project works with homeless teens in the school districts of Brunswick, RSU 1 and SAD 75 to help them find a safe place to live, reunify with family, access resources and complete schooling.

#### Warm Thy Neighbor

• Tedford Housing raises funds each winter to provide one-time, emergency heating assistance to extremely low-income families and individuals in the community.

## MUUSAN SEVENTH ANNIVERSARY ANNUAL MEETING May 12, 2018

The MUUSAN Annual meeting at the UUCommunity Church in Augusta was an enjoyable, inspirational and informational success!



Perhaps the most memorable by many was the wonderful talk by Rev. Elizabeth Nguyan, the guest speaker, that felt more like a personal conversation than a keynote address. Rev. Nguyan spoke with such authority and compassion about situations and choices we may encounter as we go about doing what we can to

bring more just behavior and circumstances into our world. She said, "Sometimes there is only the hard way". She said, "Sometimes the best we can do is to choose between two bad or difficult options" and go on from there...a difficult option for many of us to accept. As a social justice organizer even before her more familiar work with, Standing on The Side of Love, Rev. Nguyan had a wide variety of experience from which to select powerful and often poignant stories to share with us about her own encounters with unfairness and oppression. Rev. Nguyan is currently the UUA Senior Strategist with *Side With Love*, formerly known as, *Standing on The Side of Love* Campaign, renamed, *Side With Love Campaign* to be more inclusive of people with physical disabilities.

Once our minds and hearts were fed we ate from a table of delicious soups, salads, breads and desserts all prepared by the MUUSAN Steering committee. Soon after, we gathered for the business of the Annual Meeting. It was a pleasure reviewing the year's successes and work waiting to be done. Of particular interest was information provided re the work of the four Issue Groups; Democracy in Action, Health Care For All, Climate Change and Racial Justice, as it related to <u>MUUSAN's Legislative Agenda</u> and the current status of bills supported or opposed during the 128th Legislature's Second Regular Session.

Also discussed was what bills may be resurrected or carried over in the next session of the legislature in terms of continued support or opposition. The Issue groups met as always and returned to the full group to report the ideas and intentions for the coming year.

As we ended the day, getting out the vote on June 12<sup>th</sup> for Rank Choice Voting had risen to the top of immediate concern and opportunity and there was a call for action! A staff person from the Chamberlain Project Foundation spoke with us re the basics of how RCV will work, distributed pamphlets and information and clarified questions asked during a Q&A. He emphasized that the language of the bill may be confusing and that we should be clear, that if a person supports RCV, they should vote "yes".

The importance of getting people to the polls is huge and we were all urged to help make it happen, to volunteer to canvas our neighborhoods and social groups, staff phone banks, write a letter to the editor or to influence people in any way we can...advocating for, **Vote YES on One.**


#### CONVERSATION WITH THE BRUNSWICK SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Author, Abenaki historian and Amherst College Professor, Lisa Brooks' lively presentation and amazing grasp of the period will bring this history to life. The event is hosted by Midcoast Indigenous Awareness Group (MIAG). We are lucky to have Lisa Brooks with us in Brunswick.



# Let Cuba Live - June 28 @ 5pm

The Church will be co-sponsoring an event on Thur, June 28, 2018 at 5:00pm which features the ecumenical group Pastors for Peace and its work on behalf of decent US relations with Cuba. We'll be welcoming Jennifer Wager, who for many years was a Pastors for Peace leader in its Cuba work.



The Let Cuba Live Committee of Maine is organizing the event, which begins with Cuban dinner at 5pm. After that, filmmaker and teacher Jennifer Wager will show her film Dare to Dream: Cuba's Latin American Medical School. She will talk about the school, which since 2005 has graduated up to 1500 new doctors annually from 100 countries, and at no personal cost. They return to their homelands to serve the underserved.

Every year since 1992 Pastors for Peace has taken activist supporters to Cuba on one of its Friendshipment Caravans. They travel and take humanitarian aid in defiance of US regulations on its economic blockade of the island, in force now for more than half a century.

That's the purpose of the event in June: to inform people about unjust, illegal US policies toward Cuba and to build support for the Friendshipment Caravan Pastors for Peace is taking to Cuba. Just as Jennifer Wager will be visiting Brunswick, other Pastors for Peace representatives will be building enthusiasm for this year's Caravan in dozens of other US cities and towns. Caravan participants will be in Cuba from July 19 to July 29.



"The Working for Justice Steering Group's wide-reaching and continuing efforts reflect a genuine commitment to improving the lives of others," Lardie said.

On Sunday, 4/29, many in our congregation joined MNMSG and more than 80 people at the Bath Senior Center to welcome the several families of new Mainers recently settled in Bath, Brunswick and Topsham. We were all warmed by the delicious food and good spirit.



MNMSG is anticipating the settling in Bath of a large Congolese family many of whom are still struggling with paper work to allow their departure from Burundi to the United States. Phippsburg UCC is taking the lead in overseeing this family's housing and arrival. With the possibility of an apartment becoming available in Bath, MNMSG is evaluating its capacity to reach out to yet another asylum seeker family. # BARBERSHOP BASH!

# Royal River Chorus & the Nor'easters Barbershop Chorus

Sat, Jun 23, 2018 @ 7:30 pm

## Why would you want to hear an evening of barbershop music?

- Barbershop is one of the few uniquely American-born styles of music. It is sung a cappella in four parts. Each part has its own role and differs from traditional chorus parts: generally, the lead sings the melody, the tenor harmonizes *above* the melody, the bass sings the lowest harmonizing notes, and the baritone completes the chord, usually below the lead.
- If you listen closely, you can experience the phenomenon of overtones. Barbershop arrangements stress chords (mostly dominant sevenths) and chord progressions that favor "ringing." When a chorus sings perfectly in tune using identical vowels, an overtone is created (a physical—some say spiritual—phenomenon in which you can hear an extra note that isn't being sung by anyone).
- Barbershoppers always put on an entertaining show with varied repertoire. You may even feel goosebumps when you hear one of their beautiful ballads, or get a thrill when you hear some of the common barbershop embellishments: swipes, key changes, bell chords, powerful dynamic changes, pregnant pauses, or unresolved chords."
- The fun and enjoyment that the performers feel is contagious. The friendship and community within each chorus is palpable. The passion they feel and the energy they display are inspiring.
- Barbershop music can bring you back to a time when life was much simpler, when music lifted the spirits of those who sang those swipes and milked those unresolved chords, when an audience appreciated good technical singing that wasn't always so serious.
