During the month of October, the theme of the Religious Education program is 'sanctuary'. We will participate in activities and workshops in which we'll explore what it means to be a people of sanctuary. What comes to mind when you hear that word? It is likely that you think of literal places as well as a set of general characteristics. Some places are specifically labeled as sanctuaries and are known that way to the general public, such as the worship space within our church. Other places are sanctuaries only to specific people- special places that an individual has found that provide peace, comfort, and safety. Sometimes the term sanctuary is used more as an adjective such as "sanctuary city" which describes a municipality that does not cooperate with government efforts to enforce immigration law.

Whenever I hear the word 'sanctuary' the first thing that always comes to my mind is a song and the first line is "Lord prepare me to be a sanctuary...". I was a worship music leader for several years in a Christian church and this song was frequently requested. In summary, it's a prayer in the form of song asking God to purify and strengthen the singer so that s/he can be a living sanctuary. While this song no longer speaks to me in the same way as it once did (I no longer believe in God nor do I believe that I need to be "purified"), I love the idea of being a living sanctuary. In a world torn by divides- racial, economic, political, gender...- I would like to be a presence that brings a sense of peace, safety, healing, acceptance and calm to those around me.

- What are ways in which we are a people of sanctuary?
- How can we offer sanctuary to individuals with marginalized identities?

MINISTER'S MUSINGS—STORM BUDDIES



How was it for you when the winds rose on September 6? That day, Shirley Bernier and I were attending to church business in the office, while the Daponte String Quartet was rehearsing in the Merry Meeting Bay room next door. Suddenly the sky darkened, and the sky

opened its flood gates. The wind blew a mighty fuss in every direction at once, pelting the church with hail. The musicians, Shirley, and I all rushed to the front door to watch, our jaws hanging down.

And then, just as quickly as the storm began, it ended.

The world was transformed, however. The church lost power, so everyone left. At least at home I could continue to work with the help of our generator. We lost an enormous pine tree in our backyard. Unfortunately, it fell on a neighbor's brand new garden, ruining her new plantings. Across the street a half a dozen trees shattered into the woods and street. Down the street, a tree fell on a neighbor's dormer. Next door, seemingly healthy pines lay in ruins, strewn across two yards. All across Brunswick, people were without power, and scores of people had major cleanup operations to launch.

The truth is, we never know what is around the corner. Many of us live through our days imagining things will proceed along just as they always do. Until suddenly they don't.

In her book, *The Trouble with Goats and Sheep*, Joanna Cannon writes, "It's strange how the worst day of your life often starts just like any other. You might even complain very quietly to yourself about its ordinariness. You might wish for something more interesting to happen, something to break the back of your routine, and just when you think you can't bear the monotony any longer, something comes along that shatters your life to such a degree, you wish, with every cell in your body, that your day hadn't become so unordinary."

The Pastoral Care Associates assist when parishioner's lives suddenly become unordinary. They reach out when they know you are sick or bereaved. In that way, they support both my particular ministry and the general, shared ministry of the whole congregation.

This year, the Pastoral Care Associates are launching a Storm Buddy system, whereby parishioners check in on one another after a major storm. They could use *your* help in making this a success.

If you live alone and want someone to call you after a storm, let Julie Dahmer or me know.

If you are willing to make some calls to others after a storm, let Julie Dahmer or me know.

We'll match people up. Our hope is that, as a result, those moments when we have to pick up the pieces after a storm won't feel so lonely and burdensome.

In my neighborhood, no one was injured on September 6. We were without power for 29 hours, and many of us are still cleaning up the mess. But that was the worst of it. We're a close neighborhood, and we had each other to lean on and commiserate with. If the losses had been catastrophic, I know we would have helped each other back on our feet again. How much worse it would be if we didn't have one another!

My neighborhood is far from the norm. Most people live relatively isolated lives. But, similar to my neighborhood, at our beloved UUCB, we do have one another—how much worse things might be if that were not so! So let us know if we can reach out to you. Or, sign up to contact someone else. (Incidentally, if you tend to feel isolated, reaching out to others might be just the ticket!) Ministering to one another during those times when life becomes unordinary is part of what our church is for.

Ellen Carlson is a well-respected teacher and organizer of the NH Fiddle Ensemble and Fiddleheads Jam Camp, Ellen has taught at workshops and festivals throughout New England and New York. She was an original member with the NH based folk/swing trio *Sweet*, *Hot & Sassy*.

Upright Bass:

Val Blachly has performed professionally since the early 70's with several bluegrass and folk bands. She is also the founding member of the swing ensemble *Sweet, Hot and Sassy*. Currently she performs with the *Mink Hills Band*, a creative, wide ranging, bluegrass/swing group.

<u>Keyboard</u>: Agnes Charlesworth studied composition and electronic music at the Center for Contemporary Music in Oakland, CA and went on to work in sound design for film, video, and performance in the Bay Area. Now living in Maine, she has created original scores and soundscapes for many local arts organizations.

<u>Tenor Sax/Clarinet</u>: In the late 90's Lee Ann Ames played with the *Afro-Cuban Jazz Orchestra* in the East Village, playing the Cape May Jazz Fest with Joe Chambers and sitting in with Mo Guajiro. After spending some time in Puerto Rico playing in plena, salsa and jazz ensembles, she moved to New Hampshire and was a member of the *Lakes Region Big Band* for several years. In 2007 she began performing with the all-female swing group, *Swing a Cat*.

<u>Guitar</u>: At one time or another, **Jim Pendergast** has performed as a sideman with almost every Grand Ole Opry star, and recorded with many of the legendary Nashville studio musicians. More recently, his attention has turned to Celtic and Irish music, a return to the folk music that captured his attention in the 1960s. For seven years, he was the leader of the *Boys of County Nashville*, the featured band at the world-famous Opryland Hotel.

<u>Drums</u>: In the late 70's **Paul Wolf** was known as one of the premiere washboard players in the country. He has played washboard in a variety of bluegrass and cajun bands, and even shared the stage with such notables as Pete Seeger, Ricky Skaggs, Jerry Douglass, and Leroy Troy. During that time he also played the drums in several Western Mass bands. Since he moved to New Hampshire in the mid 80s, Paul has played percussion in many Portsmouth-area and Massachussetts bands of varying genres: Blues, Rockabilly, R&B, Funk, Disco, Bluegrass, Honky-tonk C&W and Jazz.

Brunswick events in acknowledgement of Indigenous Peoples' Day

In recognition of Brunswick's second annual Indigenous Peoples Day, Midcoast Indigenous Awareness Group (MIAG) is sponsoring a series of presentations, films, and discussions to be held locally from September 29 through October 9. (See adjacent flyer) In planning, MIAG has focused on providing opportunities to learn more about the ongoing presence, culture, and current challenges of local native people, as well as the true history of this land.

MIAG, a group of Midcoast citizens originally called together by the UUCB Working for Justice Steering Group, worked together with the Brunswick Town Council last year, to pass a resolution to celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day on the 2nd Monday in October. Since then, MIAG has sponsored numerous events in this area with the intention of enhancing local awareness. The mission of the group is "to support indigenous awareness through education and programming,"

while envisioning "a community living in responsible relationship to the local waters and lands, and life thereon, acknowledging and respecting the ongoing indigenous presence here."

Indigenous Peoples' Day is now honored in many communities, cities, and states across the country. In Maine, locales include, but are not limited to: Belfast, Orono, Bangor, Bar Harbor, Old Town, Starks, Brunswick, and Portland. There are initiatives under way in other communities, as well.

"Embracing Indigenous Peoples' Day is a recognition of the beauty and strength of our ancestors while sending a message to our children, grandchildren, and those not yet born that they come from a beautiful, strong, and resilient people." -Seattle's Indigenous Peoples Day resolution author Matt Remle (Lakota).

MAINE ALLCARE



Maine AllCare (MAC), a non-partisan, not-for-profit educational and advocacy group, promotes establishment of publicly funded healthcare coverage for all Maine residents. MAC advocates that healthcare be treated as a public good, since it is fundamental to our well-being as individuals and as a democratic state.

The system MAC envisions must be efficient, financially sound, politically sustainable and provide comprehensive benefits without deductibles or co-pays, fairly distributed to all. Likewise, when well, everyone contributes. Individuals, families, businesses, providers and Maine's economy benefit.



MAC's database has ~25,000 supporters; and there are 10 currently active Chapters- including the Greater Brunswick Area Chapter (meets at UUCB). MAC has a 15 person Board that includes 7 physicians and 2 Senators, and is in a "Healthcare is a Human

Right" coalition with Maine State Nurses Association and Southern Maine Workers Center.

The Working for Justice Steering Group is hoping to have a representative from each Charity with Soul available after the first Sunday service of the month in which their particular charity is the selected Charity with Soul.

On **Sunday October 7th at 11:30 AM**, Bill Clark, a member of our church and one of the founding members of Maine AllCare, will be available in the May Sarton room to meet with anyone interested in learning more about MaineAllCare and to answer questions. Maine AllCare is endorsed by MUUSAN (Maine UU State Advocacy Network).

Get Out The Vote!

MUUSAN'S first meeting of the fall set a happy, high energy bar for meetings that follow. Twenty three UUs from sixteen congregations across Maine met with can do enthusiasm for the mornings, Get *Out The Vote* agenda.

Sarah Rawlings from League of Women Voters ME and ME Clean Elections provided historical as well as extremely useful information and advocacy that emphasized the urgency of and strategies for getting people to the polls on Nov. 6th. Voting by Absentee Ballot was strongly encouraged. Sarah believes doing so will help balance the work required of election workers and free the rest of us on election day to help where and whenever needed. Primary message however was to do all things possible to get out the vote.

Look for copies of the excellent LWVME Voter Guide to be available at church as soon as they are delivered to us the first part of October.

Issue Groups: Democracy in Action, Health Care For All, Racial Justice and Climate Change met briefly to begin planning action and advocacy priorities. Since the 128th legislature didn't adjourn until September 13th

instead of April as they should have, it was premature to spend a lot of time planning for legislative lobbying.

Highlights of the, Sanctuary Summit hosted by MUUSAN on a Saturday in August were presented. The Summit was an idea brought home from the spring General Assembly as one way to bring together Maine UU congregations for "learning and planning about how to build closer relationships with Maine's immigrants and refuges, discern their needs and address unmet needs as invited". Stay tuned for information and ideas incubated at the Summit as they are shared with congregations.

ABOUT JOSEPH JACKSON



Joseph Jackson is Co-coordinator of Maine Prisoner Advocacy Coalition (MPAC), comprised of Maine prisoners, their friends and families, victims of crime, and others committed to ethical, positive, and humane changes in Maine's prison system. In addition, he is Youth and Community liaison at Maine Inside Out. Mr. Jackson was convicted in 1995 of manslaughter and sentenced to the Maine Department of Corrections where he served 19 years. As a prisoner, Mr. Jackson completed Literacy Volunteer Training, PEER Education, Work Ready Alternatives to Violence, One, Two, and Three. He is a founder of the Maine State Prison chapter of the NAACP and has served on its executive committee in several capacities from 2003-2012. While incarcerated, Mr. Jackson earned his Associate and Bachelor degrees summa cum laude from the University of Southern Maine (USM), Augusta. Later that year, he was selected as a member of Who's Who among students in colleges and universities in 2012. Mr. Jackson became the first prisoner in Maine to be selected to USM's graduate program at StoneCoast while still a prisoner. Mr. Jackson represented USM in Augusta's 50 years 50 portraits for their 50 year anniversary in 2015. Mr. Jackson earned his Master's Degree from USM and was one of four commencement speakers for his class.

Joseph Jackson will be the guest speaker at the October 14th worship service.
