MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Joseph Jackson's sermon on October 14 was one of the most moving I have ever heard. Joseph told the story of how one person – Alice Rossiter, a member of our congregation – changed his life by reaching out to him while he was incarcerated. Their backgrounds and life experiences could not have been more different. But, over the years, through letters, phone calls, and occasional times when Alice could visit Joseph in prison, they grew to love each other deeply.

While Joseph was in prison Alice funded one college course per semester for him, and she witnessed him receiving his Associates Degree. Unfortunately, Alice died just before Joseph received his Bachelor's Degree, which was also shortly before he was released from prison. (He has since completed his Master's Degree.) But she died knowing he was about to be released and graduate from college. While she was living, she and Joseph discussed every one of his assignments. Their discussions were not confined to academics, however; Joseph said they talked about everything.

Joseph said he owes to Alice both his academic success and his ability to land on his feet and thrive post-incarceration. (Actually, what he said is that he "owes everything" to Alice.) He stressed that one person truly can make a difference. Alice was proof of that. Joseph's story was one of hope, fortitude, and courage.

After the service, people asked me if there were a way they could become pen pals with an inmate. I know of two programs for reaching out (though only one of them is specifically for pen pals).

College Guild: Offers free, non-traditional correspondence courses to inmates who want to challenge their thinking, increase their creativity, and relieve their boredom. Any prisoner in the U. S can enroll in College Guild courses. Students send their assignments to College Guild, who farms them out to volunteers to provide feedback and guidance. That's where you come in: College Guild is always looking for volunteers to comment on inmates' assignments. In this program, both inmates and volunteers remain anonymous. You choose the subject matter you are most interested in working with, and College Guild distributes the assignments. Chances are that, over time, you will end up working with a variety of prisoners. the Church of the Larger Fellowship: Establishes a ono-on-one letter writing connection between you and an incarcerated UU. In some cases, a prisoner's pen pal may be their only connection to the outside world. The Worthy Now Prison Ministry Network has other programs, too: training for people interested in visiting and/or advocating for prisoners; facilitated on-line support circles for people engaged in prison ministry; classes about issues of mass incarceration. (You can find a pen pal through this program, but your pen pal may not necessarily be incarcerated in Maine; s/he could be anywhere in the U.S.) For more information visit https://worthynow.org/.

If I learn of other programs, I will let you know.


Meanwhile, as I contemplate November and its invitation to name things for which I am grateful, I would name the transformative October 14th service. Joseph Jackson helped to buoy up my own sense of flagging hope. He also reminded me that sometimes little things can make a big difference. After all, Alice used letter writing and sometimes phone calls and visits as her primary tools. She was able to fund some courses in the state university system, too. For those contributions to Joseph's well being, she needed time, attention, and relatively small periodic financial outlay. More than anything, she needed an open heart and the willingness to reach out. Are there small ways you can reach out to others? Remember, what may seems like a small gesture can have a big impact for someone in need.

BLACK LIVES MATTER AT UUCB — OUR ONE YEAR ANNIVERSARY

A year ago this month we hung our Black Lives Matter banner on the church building. To mark the occasion, a letter to the editor of the Times Record is being written and the Working for Justice Steering Group will host a congregational conversation (time and place to be announced at a later date) to reflect on our experience and commitment.

The initiative to hang a banner started with the Membership Committee in the spring of 2017. The Board agreed to bring it to a vote of the congregation at the Annual Meeting in June. Prior to that meeting the congregation was invited to share their thoughts and questions at two scheduled church discussions facilitated by Sylvia. At the annual meeting the following motion was approved:

That the congregation endorse and support the Black Lives Matter movement and honor UUA's request for UU churches to become visually and audibly involved in related issues. Our involvement will be studying the issues and displaying a "Black Lives Matter" banner on the church.



The Board formed a task force to research options for design and placement of the banner, and to organize ongoing study and education. The task force named itself Black Lives Matter/Challenging Our White Supremacy. The banner was installed on November 11, along with a statement for passers-by explaining our action, and a variety of opportunities for increasing our understanding of racism were presented throughout the year. The task force was dissolved in June 2017 but the work continues under the umbrella of the Working for Justice Steering Group. Watch for opportunities in the coming year to engage in the transformative work of challenging our white supremacy.



The Gathering Place

WELCOME IS OUR MISSION



The Gathering Place is the only drop-in day center that welcomes the homeless, isolated and deeply poor of the greater Brunswick area. We opened our new facility in September of 2016 and have seen a 40% increase in our daily attendance. 85-100 men, women and children who visit us each day now have a warm and inviting place where they are greeted with a hot cup of coffee and a welcoming smile. We provide hot drinks, snacks, games, puzzles, computer terminals for job and apartment searches, and weekly enrichment programs.

At The Gathering Place we provide many of the basic life necessities that we take for granted when we have a home of our own: access to bathrooms, toiletries and clean clothing; phone and mail service; assistance obtaining photo identification; and referral to needed community resources such as mental health services, substance abuse treatment, and transitional or permanent supportive housing if requested.

We have 65 active volunteers; six volunteers and two supervisors on duty each day collectively working over 100 hours per week. We are open Monday-Saturday.

Because The Gathering Place is a low-demand dropin center, we succeed in drawing in all who need support and companionship. Building trust with our guests through small but positive interactions results in their willingness to accept social connections as well as access additional needed services toward helping regain stability.

The Gathering Place works every day to support its mission of providing hospitality, support and respect to all who pass through our doors. We are an example of what happens when a community opens its heart to offer its most vulnerable neighbors the idea of home. If someone is alone, volunteers sit with them and after initiating a conversation, they listen intently. We don't give advice or try to fix our guests. Nor do we judge them. Just by listening to their story we acknowledge them as an equal.

Where love exists, it is a reflection of the divine, and this is evident at The Gathering Place. The guidance and love reflected in the simple acts of kindness exchanged between our volunteers and guests has created a real community.

The Gathering Place is open Mon-Fri. 8:30am-3:00pm and 8:30am-11:30am on Saturday. We are located at 5 Tenney Way (off Union Street).



Have you been feeling the urge to help with the important issues in Maine, but don't know where to start? MUUSAN is the place! (Stands for Maine Unitarian Universalist Advocacy Network). Saturday, November 10 at the Unitarian Church in Augusta is our next meeting (a pleasant 45 min drive).

This year MUUSAN is focusing on several important issues which include: voting issues, health care and racial justice. The November meeting will be discussing priority legislation coming up which MUUSAN can assist with.

November 6 - Election Day - is almost here. Please remind family, friends, and especially young folks to vote. Reminders: If you are voting early, the 3rd day before Election Day is the last day to vote. If voting by absentee ballot, you must mail the ballot by Election Day. If you are prevented from voting at the polls and you think you should be able to vote, request a "challenge ballot." Voter Guides prepared by the League of Women Voters are available throughout Brunswick and surrounding towns with information about candidates and referendum questions.

A table will be set up in Fellowship Hall on **Sunday**, **November 4** with a place for donations of snacks.



The Board has been busy. One urgent and important matter we've been working on has to do with the sale of our neighbor's property at 9 Middle Street. Please see the special announcement on page 15 of this Parish Messenger for important related information.

Focusing on more long-term thinking, the Executive Committee, Sylvia, and one other member of the congregation attended (and hosted) a workshop entitled *Claiming our Spiritual Leadership* presented by the New England Region UUA Staff Team on Saturday, October 13th. 48 UUs from other New England churches joined us. It was a very productive

day, including time devoted to both inner work and practical strategies for moving forward. The UUCB team will be meeting together in November to review what we learned and to consider ways to apply the new learning to our own leadership.

During the 2017-2018 church year, one of the Board's goals focused on "Living Our Mission in the Wider Community." The Task Force created to work on this goal recommended creation of a new volunteer position with the job description in the box below.

Special Board Announcement & Congregation Meeting Nov. 11

As most of you know, the property of our neighbor to the south at 9 Middle Street is for sale. Since this first became known to us at the end of July, 2018, several members of the congregation have been working diligently with the Board to explore the options available to UUCB. The Board now has a recommendation which we believe represents the best possible outcome for the church.

A detailed document describing all of the steps the Board has taken regarding the property will be made available via all-church email and in the church office. Briefly stated, we have discovered that both the congregation and our neighbor at 9 Middle Street have been sharing an erroneous assumption. As the Board explored the possibility of purchasing some of the land between the two buildings, we discovered a discrepancy with regard to the boundary. An extensive title search yielded evidence that the church actually already owns the grassy strip of land 23.75 feet beyond what we had thought was our property line. After careful review of

this new information, the surveyor who did the original work for the new building confirmed the error.

One complication is the fact that the existing paved driveway for 9 Middle Street encroaches a short distance into the 23.75' strip of land. As that could lead to legal complications, the Board agreed that UUCB needed a plan to address the issue. After considering a variety of possible options, the Board is recommending that UUCB deed to the neighbor a 3-foot border around the paved driveway.

A special meeting of the congregation has been scheduled for Sunday, November 11th after the worship service to vote on this recommendation. Two informational meetings have been scheduled prior to the vote—one after the service on November 4th, and the other on Wednesday evening, November 7th at 7:00 pm. Please be sure to attend one of these information sessions and the special meeting on November 11th.
