## MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Here, more or less, are the words I shared at the Brunswick Women's March on January 19:

It was only after I had agreed to speak today that news stories about fractures within the Women's March community started to flood my news feed. Charges of anti-Semitism. Of exclusion and prejudice.

If I had known about those charges, would I have chosen to speak? Yes, because this is a teaching moment for everyone.

Today's local event is focused on unity, following the lead of Women's March Maine which (and these are their words): unequivocally denounce(s) anti-Semitism, racism, misogyny, homophobia, transphobia, and xenophobia, while acknowledging that each of us as individuals have learning and work to do. We commit individually and collectively to continuing that work.

It is in that spirit that I address you today.

I once served a church that had a bumper sticker that read: "The most radical thing we can do is to introduce ourselves to one another." I like that message, because in our world we are often isolated in silos of similar, likeminded people. I like the idea of breaking free of those silos, befriending the stranger as we do so.

But I would go one step further. My bumper sticker would read: "The most radical thing we can do is to listen to one another."

No matter who you are: cisgender, transgender, lesbian, straight, rich, poor, Jewish, Muslim, Christian, Buddhist, secular, atheist, black, Asian, Hispanic, white, conservative, liberal, apolitical – or any other descriptor that may represent the very real life you live in your very real body – if you are a woman, you have been influenced by a culture that historically and systemically favors men over you.

If you are male, you, too, have been harmed by sexism. At the very least, the sexism that harms the women in your lives – your mothers, your partners, your daughters – confers itself to you in some way.

And if you are non-binary, identifying neither as female nor male, sexism has harmed you, too, perhaps most notably in our culture's determination to squeeze you into a



category where you don't feel you belong.

Sexism harms all of us.

We all have stories to tell.

What if we listened to one another's stories – aiming to hear one another, not judge one another; to understand one another, not convince one another of our own particular rightness?

#### What if?

It's not easy to listen. Simply listen ... without fixing, blaming, explaining, judging, or – worst of all – interrupting. But, if we really took to heart the work of listening, change would come. We would create building blocks for the Beloved Community that American philosopher Josiah Royce described over 100 years ago and that MLK Jr. later advocated.

Until we can really hear one another, misunderstanding and injustice will flourish, and the Beloved Community will remain frustratingly distant.

Today we share precious moments together. Suppose we do the most radical thing we can do and listen, really listen, to one another.

Tell me your story. I'd like to hear it.

With that in mind, the RE Committee recommended to the Board that we hire a Consulting Sunday School Coordinator on a part-time basis (10-15 hours weekly) for the remainder of the current church year, and then hire an Acting Religious Education Director for 2019-2020.

We have been very lucky in our timing. We have already filled the coordinator position, and by the time you read this many will have met Taryn J. Walker in church. It was clear to everyone who met Taryn in the hiring process that she is a real find, and we are thrilled to have her join us. ## WORKING FOR JUSTICE STEERING GROUP

## Maine Unitarian Universalist Social Advocacy Network (MUUSAN)

Faith Woodman attended the bimonthly meeting of MUUSAN on January 21st in Augusta and submitted the following report.



meeting was an address from Rep. Pinny Beebe-Center, a UU from Rockland, who gave an encouraging report on the new priorities of the legislature. She said the tone of the legislature is very different. The legislators plan to work in a collaborative manner on both sides of the aisle. There will be more openness and responsiveness on the part of legislators as to the pub-

The highlight of the MUUSAN

lic's input and concerns. She says legislators will hold community forums throughout the state to hear from constituents and to get citizens involved.

There will be efforts to repair and rebuild relationships with the Native tribes, and new Attorney General, Aaron Frey, intends to interpret the law much more liberally in favor of the tribes than predecessor Janet Mills.

There are a number of proposed bills on environmental laws, including solar legislation, that are expected to be passed. Maine Care is also expected to pass, as well, and the legislature will definitely consider a constitutional amendment for rank choice voting.

Beebe-Center serves on the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee and expects some positive progressive legislative changes in that area. She encouraged everyone to contact his or her legislators, as well as committee chairs, on specific legislation, and to testify at public hearings. *Don't bother signing online petitions, she advises*. They are not effective. Contact the legislators directly either by phone or email. There are now six UUs in the legislature. MUUSAN will encourage them to form a UU Caucus. The MUUSAN Racial, Native and Immigrant Justice subgroup reported that it has finished putting together resources for an Immigrant Justice Toolkit, and it will be available soon on the MUUSAN website.

## MPAC Community Meeting at UUCB Saturday Feb. 9 at 10am

When Joseph Jackson spoke at UUCB this fall, he was so impressed with our facility and the warm welcome he received that he asked if his organization, Maine Prisoner Advocacy Coalition (MPAC), could hold one of its bimonthly public meetings in our building. The Board approved the Working for Justice Steering Group's request to co-sponsor this meeting.

These community meetings offer the public an opportunity to hear updates about MPAC's work, and action steps that citizens can take to help advocate for prisoners' rights. **The focus of the February meeting will be on current legislation about prison reform, and the recent political changes in Augusta,** specifically Governor Mills' appointment of Randall Liberty, former warden of the Maine State Prison, to State Commissioner of Corrections.

"These community action meetings always have such an impact on our work," says Joseph Jackson. "People leave with a sense of not only what we are doing to improve conditions in the prison system, but also with a specific set of action steps they might take to help in this area."
